

How California can address economic disparities between coastal and inland regions

California is an economic powerhouse. It is a center of innovation and birthplace to world-leading enterprises – and may soon become the world’s fourth largest economy.

But this is only half of the story.

While the knowledge-based economies of California’s coastal metropolises have surged ahead in recent decades, the state’s inland and rural regions have been left behind.

As a result, California features shocking regional disparities in income, employment and education. Personal income in the Inland Empire is less than two-thirds per capita compared to Orange County. Fewer than a quarter of the people in the Inland Empire earned a bachelor’s degree but more than 40% did in Orange County.

To reduce these disparities, less prosperous regions need inclusive regional economic development. In other words, they need both sustainable economic growth and greater economic inclusion.

Fortunately, state leaders have begun to promote regional approaches to economic development. Last year, the governor and Legislature invested \$600 million in the new Community Economic Resilience Fund. Known shorthand as CERF, the fund will support regional collaboratives encompassing business, labor, community organizations, local government and other stakeholders as they create and implement strategies for inclusive development.

The state’s support for inclusive regional economic growth deserves recognition. However, on its own, CERF does not provide the support, coordination or leadership needed to reduce the economic disparities between regions.

The Little Hoover Commission, California’s independent government oversight agency, identified steps state leaders can take to help lift up California’s less prosperous regions in a new report.

First, California must prioritize historically disadvantaged regions for CERF funding and other related programs. The institutional capacity to advance economic growth varies by region, and some need additional investment much more than others. The state can maximize its spending and help rectify longstanding inequities by

Rob Franek, The Princeton Review’s editor in chief wrote in a news release, “However, every MBA program – on-campus as well as online – that made our lists for 2023 offers outstanding academics, superb experiential components, and impressive career services. As important, every one garnered positive ratings from MBA students we surveyed who attend – or are recent grads of – the program.”

For the entrepreneurial rankings, Franek wrote, “We strongly recommend these schools on our entrepreneurship studies lists for 2023. Their faculties are outstanding. Their programs have

robust mentoring components, and their students receive networking support that will serve them for years to come.”

According to the company, its “business school rankings incorporate student opinion as well as institutional data, and cover many different categories to help prospective applicants find the MBA programs that best fit their needs and goals. We consider many factors, from the quality of professors to emerging career paths like sustainability management.”

The online MBA survey for students, which also evaluated more than 30 unique fields, allowed students to rate their faculty, their fellow students, career preparation, academics, the technology platform, and overall satisfaction with their programs. The school survey included questions on student persistence, admissions selectivity, faculty and staff, technology and support, cost and aid, career, attendance, and alumni giving.

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BLACK HISTORY MONTH

It's Black History Month. Here are 3 things to know about the annual celebration

February marks Black History Month, a tradition that got its start in the Jim Crow era and was officially recognized in 1976 as part of the nation's bicentennial celebrations. It aims to honor the contributions that African Americans have made and to recognize their sacrifices.

Here are three things to know about Black History Month:

It was Negro History Week before it was Black History Month

In 1926, Carter G. Woodson, the scholar often referred to as the “father of Black history,” established Negro History Week to focus attention on Black contributions to civilization. According to the NAACP, Woodson — at the time only the second Black American after W.E.B. Du Bois to earn a doctorate from Harvard University — “fervently believed that Black people should be proud of their heritage and [that] all Americans should understand the largely overlooked achievements of Black Americans.”

Woodson, the son of former enslaved people, famously said: “If a race has no history, if it has no worthwhile tradition, it becomes a negligible factor in the thought of the world, and it stands in danger of being exterminated.”

Woodson chose a week in February because of Abraham Lincoln, whose birthday was Feb. 12, and Frederick Douglass, who was born enslaved and did not know his actual birth date, but chose to celebrate it on Feb. 14.

“Those two people were central to helping to afford Black people the experience of freedom that they have now,” says W. Marvin Dulaney, president of the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH), which Woodson founded in 1915 and today is the official promoter of Black History Month.

In the decades after the Civil War and through the racial violence that erupted across the country in the years following World War I, there was a concerted effort to repress the teaching of Black history.

“In the South, they tried to suppress Black history or African American history in the public schools,” Dulaney says, “particularly about things like Reconstruction and slavery, literally distorting the curriculum.”

At the university level, Black studies programs were almost nonexistent, he says. “California was the first state to actually mandate Black history in 1951 for the public schools.”

Largely as a result of the civil rights and Black consciousness movements of the 1960s, “you saw an uptick in Black history courses,” says

LaGarrett King, an associate professor of social studies education at the University at Buffalo.

Across the country, public schools “created all these courses and mandates for Black history,” unofficially creating a Black History Month, King says.

The Black press also helped push the idea, says Marcus Hunter, a sociology professor at the University of California, Los Angeles.

“The Chicago Defender, the Philadelphia Tribune, the Baltimore Afro-American ... they all started to say that this is something we're celebrating,” Hunter says.

By 1976, it became official, with President Gerald R. Ford declaring February as Black History Month and calling on the public to “seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history.”

Today, Black History Month is also celebrated in Canada every February and the United Kingdom in October.

There's a new theme every year

Each year, the ASALH chooses a different theme for Black History Month. This year, the theme is “Black Resistance.”

“African Americans have resisted historic and ongoing oppression, in all forms, especially the racial terrorism of lynching, racial pogroms, and police killings since our arrival upon these shores,” the ASALH says of this year's theme. “These efforts have been to advocate for a dignified self-determined life in a just democratic society in the United States and beyond the United States political jurisdiction.”

Dulaney says this year's theme was chosen, in part, because of the current politically charged environment around race.

He calls efforts in states like Florida, which recently rejected a new Advanced Placement course covering African American studies, and Alabama, where the State Board of Education has voted to limit how educators can talk about race in the classroom, “a strong retrenchment” against coming to terms with Black history. In light of that, the theme seemed appropriate this year, Dulaney says.

King acknowledges that some people might interpret this year's theme as politically provocative, but it shouldn't be seen that way.

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prioritizing CERF funds for more disadvantaged regions.

Second, state government needs to align resources in support of regional plans and priorities. There is significant federal and state funding available to support regional economic growth efforts — the commission identified \$9.3 billion in one-time state funding alone. The catch? It is spread across more than 50 programs administered by almost 20 agencies. Regions cannot be expected to coordinate all these resources alone.

Third, state leaders must put equal emphasis on

growth and inclusion. California must address the significant economic disparities that exist within regions, as well as those between them. State government must work with less prosperous regions to build on their strengths and make their economies more productive, competitive and innovative while ensuring that disadvantaged communities benefit.

Fourth, California should increase regional capacity for inclusive development. Building cross-sector partnerships in support of inclusive economic development requires significant time and money. Regions need reliable resources to build and sustain these efforts once CERF ends.

Next, the state must institutionalize regular reporting of key regional economic metrics to remind the public of the inequities the state has yet to fully address and keep us on track.

Lastly, California's looming \$24 billion budget deficit makes this work even more important, and state government must be a wise steward of taxpayer money. In this case, that means doing more to organize existing resources in support of regional economic opportunities. To ensure that this effort is efficient and coordinated over the long term, the governor should appoint a single, senior leader responsible for regional economic development.

The community resilience fund has the potential to advance the economies of California's less prosperous regions. But without further action, the state risks turning this transformational opportunity into yet another one-time program that supports some helpful, localized projects but ultimately yields limited transformational impact.

California cannot let this opportunity go to waste.

The Princeton Review chose the schools for its 2023 undergraduate and graduate entrepreneurship rankings based on surveys of schools conducted from June through August 2022. Nearly 300 schools reported data about their entrepreneurship offerings.

For the entrepreneurial survey, the methodology included academics and requirements, students and faculty, alumni entrepreneurial ventures, outside the classroom programs such as competitions hosted by the school/program, and scholarships and aid.

The Greenlining Institute announced Greenlining the Block, a new multi-year initiative to build power in community-based organizations that are advancing climate justice neighborhood projects with a \$6.75 million commitment of resources to communities across California, Colorado, Illinois, Virginia, North Carolina, and Michigan. The initiative aims to leverage federal investments through the Justice40 initiative, Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, and the Inflation Reduction Act to ensure benefits reach communities of color that continue to feel the impacts of decades of inequities in infrastructure funding.

Greenlining the Block will resource the leadership and expertise of communities of color to prepare for, and lead effective climate action that meets community needs. Greenlining will work directly with Black, Indigenous, people of color-led community organizations to:

Wanda Blake's cooking apprenticeship started in her mother's kitchen. It then continued in the kitchens of great aunts, aunties, grandmas, and cousins. The business' first pop-up, "Sunday Supper", was in memory of Sunday dinners at grandma's house. Wanda's Cooking has shipped Pepper Chowchow as far south as Tasmania, Australia and as far north as Juno, Alaska.

Today, Wanda feels empowered with how her business is performing. "It is growing at a steady pace that allows me to keep learning from other entrepreneurs, my community and my own mistakes," said Wanda. "Having established my business plan clearly has left me with a peace of mind, I did not have before."


Within the next year, Wanda hopes to scale her business by having her products tested and approved for retail shelf storage throughout the state. Potentially the nation, too. As a result, she plans on securing a retail space to produce, manufacture and sell her products in one place. "Thanks to Centro, I am aware that in order to grow as an entrepreneur, I have to stay open to feedback and constructive criticism, one never stops learning".
