Urban Planners' New Enemy

On a slow afternoon back in 2005, I found myself thumbing through one of the oddest books I had ever come across. It was a 733-page treatise on parking by Donald Shoup, an economist at the University of California, Los Angeles, who had devoted much of his career to collecting every available nugget of information on the subject. What made the book so unusual wasn't just the level of detail. It was Shoup's palpable enthusiasm for the material and his ability to make it interesting. He quoted Albert Einstein and Robert Frost, Lewis Carroll and Graham Greene. He filled up the pages with quirky little details about the way ordinary people go about their lives.

All this detail was made to serve a fairly simple point: "Free" parking costs cities and their residents a fortune and gives us little more than traffic congestion and ugly downtowns. Abolishing all those free spaces could bring about a renewal of high-quality urban life. Despite his verbosity, Shoup made his main point concisely and rather convincingly. Intrigued as I was, however, I dismissed him as an erudite eccentric certain to be branded as a crackpot by the pragmatic engineers and politicians who design and govern American cities.

I was quite wrong about that. Eleven years after publication of The High Cost of Free Parking, you won't find many people making jokes about it. Unlikely as it once seemed, Shoup's ideas have taken root in cities all over the country. Urban planners who scarcely gave parking a second thought in the pre-Shoup era have come to regard it as a crucial force in determining the future of their communities.

This has happened for several reasons. One is the mountain of numbers and facts that Shoup and his allies have brought to the subject. More than 30 percent of the area in many downtown commercial cores is taken up by parked cars. In many places, there are four times as many parking spaces as there are vehicles. Even so, as many as half the cars crowding center city streets at any one time are cruising for a place to park. It doesn't make a lot of sense.

Hispanic-Owned Businesses on the Upswing






Image credit: wallethub.com ceipts in 2012, an increase of 35.1 percent from \$350.7 billion in 2007. In contrast, receipts for all firms grew 11.7 percent during the same period, from \$30.0 trillion in 2007 to \$33.5 trillion in 2012.

These statistics come from the 2012 Survey of Business Owners, which provides a broad socioeconomic picture of business owners across the nation and is part of the U.S. Census Bureau's five-year economic census.

The Survey of Business Owners not only identifies whether business owners are of Hispanic origin in general, but also their nationality, or specific Hispanic group. Each Hispanic group saw the rate of increase between 2007 and 2012 in the number of firms they owned outpace the national average: Cuban (up 12.4 percent to 281,982), Mexican (up 56.8 percent to 1.6 million), other Hispanic or Latino (up 44.1 percent to 1.1 million) and Puerto Rican (up 65.0 percent to 258,221).

Additionally, slightly under half of Hispanicowned firms (approximately 1.5 million, or 44.5 percent) in 2012 were owned by women.

Annual Survey of Entrepreneurs

More business statistics from the inaugural 2014 Annual Survey of Entrepreneurs, which provides statistics for employer businesses only, show that among the nation's nearly 300,000 Hispanic-owned firms with paid employees, more than half were located in one of three states: California (66,487), Florida (59,987) or Texas (49,722). Among the 50 most populous metro areas, Hispanic-owned firms were most commonly found in Miami-Ft. Lauderdale-West Palm Beach (44,599), New York-Newark-Jersey City (28,949) and Los Angeles-Long Beach-Anaheim (28,858).

Returning to the nation as a whole, Hispanicowned employer firms were most likely to be

found in the accommodations and food services (40,371) and construction (40,340) sectors.

The survey also revealed a wide range of additional findings about Hispanic business owners and their firms. For example:

- 96.1 percent of Hispanic-owned businesses (that reported language information) conduct transactions in English, with 66.9 percent conducting transactions in Spanish, potentially in addition to other languages.
- 13.1 percent of Hispanic-owned businesses (compared with 8.9 percent of all businesses that provided the time in businesses information) have been in business less than two years.
- 57.7 percent of Hispanic-owned businesses (that provided profitability information) were profitable; another 20.5 percent had losses, while 21.9 percent broke even.
- 52.4 percent of Hispanic business owners (who reported citizenship information) were not born a U.S. citizen.
- 35.7 percent of Hispanic business owners (who provided the education information) had a bachelor's degree or higher prior to establishing, purchasing, or acquiring the business.
- 20.2 percent of Hispanic business owners (who provided the information) spend an average of 60 or more hours per week managing or working in the business, and 48.2 percent spend more than 40 hours doing so.

A separate topical module in the Annual Survey of Entrepreneurs focused on innovation and research and development activities of businesses. Responses to the survey from Hispanic-owned businesses revealed, for instance, that 34.4 percent

With the recent conclusion of another annual celebration of Hispanic Heritage Month, here are two sources of business data that show gains in America's Hispanic-owned businesses.

Survey of Business Owners

The number of U.S. businesses owned by Hispanics grew by more than 1 million firms, or 46.3 percent, from 2.3 million to 3.3 million from 2007 to 2012. In contrast, the total number of all U.S. firms increased 2.0 percent during the same period, from 27.1 million to 27.6 million.

Hispanic business ownership is defined as having people of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban or other Hispanic origin (such as Dominican or Salvadoran) owning more than 50.0 percent of the stock or equity in a nonfarm business operating in the United States. Hispanics owned 12.0 percent of all businesses in 2012, up from 8.3 percent five

The rate of increase in receipts for Hispanicowned firms also outpaced that of all firms. Hispanic-owned firms totaled \$473.6 billion in re-

This phenomenal out-migration has been covered by the San Francisco Chronicle, New York Times, BBC of London, worldwide internet, etc. to name a few. QUESTION: WHAT ARE WE GOING TO DO TO REVERSE THIS OUT-MIGRATION?

There have been no initiatives to keep African Americans in this City. NONE! Gentrification has been allowed to run rampant for African Americans with no effort to correct the demise of the Fillmore District! In the richest major City in the nation, hardly any City funds have been deployed to support the Black business community. Community has been drawn as to what needs to be done.



Council OKs Mayor's Plan to Spur Local Business Development, Improve Neighborhoods

As part of his ongoing efforts to encourage economic growth and create jobs so all San Diego neighborhoods can succeed, Mayor Kevin L. Faulconer today gained unanimous City Council approval of a \$2.5 million plan to spur business development, provide job training and improve urban spaces.

The money will come from San Diego Regional Enterprise Zone funds, which was a California-sponsored business tax credit program to support economic and work force development initiatives. That program was terminated in 2013, but there remained administrative revenue that could be used to support local economic initiatives. Mayor Faulconer recommended the \$2.5 million in remaining funding go toward eight initiatives that support the City's economic and workforce development goals.

"Strong communities are built on the foundation of strong local economies," Mayor Faulconer said. "These initiatives will give local businesses and nonprofits the chance to grow and provide opportunity to residents in neighborhoods that have been traditionally underserved."

City Council President Myrtle Cole and Councilmembers Chris Cate and Barbara Bry joined Mayor Faulconer in supporting the plan at a news conference earlier today.

The eight initiatives and funding amounts are:

One San Diego 100 Program – \$300,000

Earlier this year, Mayor Faulconer launched the One San Diego 100 initiative – an at-risk youth and young adult employment and mentoring program with the goal of having 100 San

Diego businesses provide 1,000 local youth with mentorships, job shadowing opportunities and paid internships. The program is a partnership with CONNECT2Careers.

Code for America Project - \$200,000

Although the City offers many business incentive and assistance programs, getting the word out about these programs can be challenging. Code for America, an organization founded to address the widening technology gap between the public and private sectors, has agreed to help the City design a new outreach tool to help entrepreneurs leverage resources, access programs to grow their businesses, and increase engagement within underinvested neighborhoods.

Alternative Financing Companies Provide a Much Needed Lending Solution For Minority Business Owners

Minority business owners continue to face challenges when applying for loans from traditional banks and lenders, but entrepreneurs should consider alternative financing as a primary lending source. This is a much easier way to secure funds without facing race-based discrimination and/or application denials.

Research on minority business lending

A recent study conducted by researchers at Brigham Young University, Utah State University and Rutgers University revealed that treatment of minority business owners seeking small business loans varied greatly from that of white business owners. The researchers used nine "mystery shoppers", three black, three white and three Hispanic small business owners who wore the same professional clothes, had similar backgrounds and sought \$60,000 loans for similar businesses.

While the participants presented similar credentials, the study found that black and Hispanic business owners were given less information on lending terms, offered less application help and were asked more personal financing questions.

Additionally, a 2016 report by The Kauffman Foundation on access to capital by race found that minorities are disproportionately impacted by lack of access to capital and cost of capital. The report also found that profitably of black entrepreneurs was negatively impacted at three times the rate of white entrepreneurs due to lack of access to capital.

Alternative financing options

Alternative financing companies (such as Timestar Lenders) offer minority business owners more options to secure business funds and ultimately increase profitability. Loans are available for a wide range of business needs including technology improvements, emergency repairs, remodeling or



general cash flow. This financing option is appealing to many small and minority business owners because the threshold to receive funding is lower and funds are dispersed within days.

For example, in order to receive a loan with Timestar Lenders, business owners must meet four criteria: Be in business for at least six months, have at least a 500 credit score, generate a minimum of \$8,000 each month in revenues and not have any

open bankruptcies although prior bankruptcies are largely accepted.

Access to Capital among Young Firms, Minority-owned Firms, Women-owned Firms, and High-tech Firms

Purpose

The availability of capital is crucial for small business startup, survival, and growth. This study investigates how the youngest small firms operated and were financed during the evolving financial environment of the recent Great Recession, especially high-tech firms and firms owned by women and minorities.

Background

The major constraint limiting the growth, expansion, and wealth creation of small firms—especially women- and minority-owned businesses—is inadequate capital. Because of their size, these small firms typically have almost no access to external funds from public markets and are bank dependent. Small firms have little or no collateral and, as relatively young firms, lack an extensive history from which future firm or management performance can be surmised, even though the firm may have high growth potential. Research also shows that bank lending is adversely affected

by a tightening of monetary policy, regulatory changes that tighten capital requirements, and bank capital crunches.

Studies indicate that women entrepreneurs have less access to financial capital or make less use of it than male entrepreneurs. Research shows that the characteristics of women-owned firms may help explain why women obtain smaller loans, pay higher interest rates, must put up higher collateral, and are dissatisfied with the bank loan process.

For instance, younger and smaller businesses, as women-owned businesses typically are, tend to be less favored by bankers, regardless of the gender of the owner.

On the equity side, women typically have limited social interaction with venture capital firms, and are under-represented among fast-growth and high-tech businesses. They also rely more on informal funding methods and self-financing. These characteristics may help explain the gender disparity in access to capital.

For many minorities, starting out at lower wealth levels also acts as a barrier to entrepreneurship.

Policy Implications

- Skill development and training have a critical role in improving the economic performance of women and minority entrepreneurs; targeted initiatives might help them build more viable businesses.
- Encouraging enrollment in science, technology, engineering, and math disciplines is another option for women and minority prospective entrepreneurs.
- Developing and expanding networks can help women and minority business owners access needed resources such as financial capital.

Overall Findings

High tech firms had higher levels of financial capital; surprisingly, they were more dependent on formal debt financing than were similar firms that

were not high tech firms at the start-up phase and in subsequent years before and during the financial crisis.

Both women- and minority-owned businesses (African American- and Hispanic-owned firms) showed some similar disparities in their capital structure relative to firms owned by men and non-minorities. They used a different mix of equity and debt capital and were more reliant on owner equity investments. The average women- or minority-owned business operated with much less financial capital, even after controlling for other factors including credit score.

During the financial crisis period, many women and minority entrepreneurs of new startups were less likely to apply for a loan, fearing denial. The researchers controlled for some characteristics that were likely to affect bank borrowing, including legal form of organization, credit score, and type of business. The evidence showed that, compared

with nonminority owners, minority owners of young firms were significantly less likely to have their loan applications approved.

Scope and Methodology

This study uses data from the Kauffman Firm Survey (KFS) to examine the financing patterns of young, minority-owned, women-owned, and high-tech firms. The KFS is a cohort of businesses that began operations in 2004 and were followed through 2010. The author used owner demographics at the firm level to define the gender and minority status of the primary owner. For firms with multiple owners, the primary owner was indicated by the largest equity share, and where there were two or more owners with equal shares, hours worked, along with other variables, were rank-ordered to identify a primary owner.

Both univariate and multivariate tests were used to examine the financial environment and capital access of these firms. Three models using logistic regression estimated separately the probability of (1) applying for a loan, (2) not applying for a loan when credit is needed for fear of loan denial, and (3) receiving a loan. Several control variables were utilized.

Mayor Garcetti hosts fair chance hiring fair to help formerly incarcerated Angelenos find jobs



A job fair hosted today by Mayor Eric Garcetti is giving formerly incarcerated Angelenos the second chances they need to find good-paying jobs and provide for themselves and their families.

The first-ever Fair Chance Hiring Fair — a partnership between Mayor Garcetti's Blue Ribbon Commission on Employment Equity, Councilmember Curren Price, Assemblymember Reginald Jones-Sawyer, Los Angeles Trade Technical College, and Uber — is bringing employers from across the City together with Angelenos looking to re-enter the job market after incarceration. The fair is being held on the campus of the Los Angeles Trade Technical College.

"Everyone in this city deserves an opportunity to secure a good-paying job — and I am committed to working with our partners to help people rebuild their lives and reclaim their dignity after incarceration," said Mayor Garcetti. "The Fair Chance Hiring Fair shows that L.A. believes in giving people the second chances they need to get back on their feet."

More than 50 employers and 30 workforce development organizations are participating in the fair, which aims to expand employment opportunities for people with nonviolent offenses on their records

"Time and again, I have heard from formerly incarcerated individuals who share a willingness to better themselves but keep getting shut out of employment," said Councilman Curren Price. "As elected officials, we must do everything in our power to expand access and opportunities, and reduce barriers to employment for formerly incarcerated individuals. After all, this is a city that is

compassionate and inclusive, and we want to see every individual — regardless of race, ethnicity, ZIP code or past — fulfill their God-given potential."

"Los Angeles is again leading the way by hosting the first-of-its-kind fair and demonstrating our commitment to bringing jobs to people who want to work but just need that second chance," added Assemblymember Reginald Jones-Sawyer. "I applaud the businesses who are standing with us today and making this important commitment to the well-being and success of communities throughout the region."

"It's truly an honor to be a part of such an ambitious initiative that aims to improve the lives of Angelenos," said Christopher Ballard, Uber Southern California General Manager. "Crime is wrong. Once a person has served their time, we need to give them a second chance. Consigning millions of people to a life of unemployment is bad for our economy and society. It's important that companies do what they can to give more people the opportunity to earn a living."

The Fair Chance Hiring Fair was organized by Mayor Garcetti's Blue Ribbon Commission on Employment Equity. The Mayor launched the Commission this year to help create more opportunities for formerly incarcerated Angelenos and others who have been historically disconnected from the job market. Last year, the Mayor established an Office of Reentry, which is now in partnership with Caltrans to employ more than 1,300 formerly incarcerated people over the next three years.

About Mayor Garcetti

Eric Garcetti is the 42nd Mayor of Los Angeles. His "back to basics" agenda is focused on job creation and solving everyday problems for L.A.

Garcetti was elected four times by his peers to serve as President of the Los Angeles City Council from 2006 to 2012. From 2001 until taking office as Mayor, he served as the Councilmember representing the 13th District which includes Hollywood, Echo Park, Silver Lake, and Atwater Village — all of which were dramatically revitalized under Garcetti's leadership.

L.A. Hiring Fair Aimed at Giving Formerly Incarcerated Individuals Employment Opportunities

Over 200 job seekers, mostly blacks and Latinos with criminal records, spoke with representatives from over 50 employers and 30 workplace development organizations situated at tables under two large canopies on the trade school's campus.

Over 200,000 aforetime incarcerated residents live in the L.A. region on an annual basis,

said Anna Bahr, a communications associate with Garcetti's office. Price, who represents L.A.'s ninth council district, said the hiring fair let those once jailed persons know people do care for them.

"We need to try to expand the workforce," the South L.A. representative said. "We know that African-Americans are disproportionately affected by the criminal justice system. The formerly incarcerated come out and the statics are 50 percent can't get a job and if they are African-American it's even higher."

Jones-Sawyer said he has seen a lot of people from South L.A., which he represents in Sacramento, released from prison with no work prospects, so he is happy that there are employers willing to employ people that have spent time behind hars.

"For our community to be rebuilt again everyone needs the opportunity to get a job," said the 59th Assembly District representative, adding that former inmates must have the chance to be productive members of society. "The only way we are going to do that is give everyone a fair chance."

Employers at the event included Uber, Grid Alternatives, Inclusion Services, General Coatings Corporation, the Santa Monica Pier, and B.M.W. Nationwide Security.

Uber Southern California General Manager Christopher Ballard said the tech giant changed its policies to allow individuals with low-level, non-violent and minor offences the opportunity to become Uber drivers.

Fee Payment Incentive – \$240,000

The City will provide qualified expedited permitting services that reduce processing times by 50 percent at a discounted rate. Projects that represent economic sectors in which San Diego wants to be competitive, such as manufacturing or research and development, can qualify.

Placemaking Revolving Loan Fund - \$400,000

Loans will be available to eligible nonprofits and businesses intending to develop or operate temporary neighborhood "place" facilities such as parklets, community gardens or farmers markets in underserved neighborhoods. The fund would provide an alternative source of project funding that could be difficult to obtain from traditional lending institutions. Loans up to \$100,000 will be available with a maximum term of three years and 0 percent financing.

Urban Spaces Activation Grants – \$200,000

These grants would allow nonprofits and businesses operating in the former enterprise zone and Promise Zone designation areas to apply for a maximum \$10,000 grant to subsidize permit costs related to the temporary activation of an urban space. Examples include educational events, interactive temporary art exhibits or outdoor theater performances.

Revolving Loan Fund Study – \$100,000

The Economic Development Department operates two loan funds that offer gap financing assistance to small and mid-size business owners with expanding operations that require capital, but are unable to

meet the loan terms of traditional banks. To determine the effectiveness of the current programs, the Economic Development Department will hire a consultant to prepare an analysis to determine if restructuring of these programs is warranted to increase their effectiveness as a valued incentive to the business community.

Capacity-Building Initiative – \$367,000

The City receives requests from neighborhood-based nonprofit workforce development organizations in need of funding. To assist these organizations, this initiative would provide an annual allocation of funds for nonprofits that operate within and serve the economic development, community development, or employment needs of residents within the former enterprise zone. Fund amounts would be limited to a maximum \$20,000 per organization, and fund beneficiaries would be required to attend the City's "Not-for-Profit Accelerator" program. Beneficiaries of this incentive would have the opportunity to reapply for program funding after five years, provided funding continues to be available.

Water & Sewer Capacity Bank – \$750,000

Businesses in San Diego pay for the amount of water they discharge into the sewer system. The capacity bank will be a valuable new incentive that businesses can apply for if they use a significant amount of water. Breweries, biotechnology firms and manufacturers can often spend hundreds of thousands of dollars on capacity fees in order to expand their facilities and create new jobs.
