Gentrification doesn't fix inner-city schools

We know the narrative on white flight: Coasting on federal perks like home loans from the Veterans Administration, G.I. bill grants, and heavy subsidization for highways, white families fled northern industrial cities like gangbusters in the 1960s. Whether this was because of financial incentives, or because they were running from court-sanctioned desegregation, the outcome was abandoned communities with devastated city tax bases.

The highest costs of white flight, however, were born by the children left behind in even more segregated, and now almost entirely poor neighborhood schools. Decades of research shows that this resulting racial and economic isolation created toxic, severely under-resourced learning environments for black and brown students, from Detroit to Philadelphia to New York City.

That white and middle-class outflow has reversed, though, in recent years in locales across the country, with many residents returning to the cities their parents had left behind. Gentrification has led to much hand-wringing among policy makers, hipsters, and long-time urban residents who whipsaw between fears of displacement and the desire for neighborhood improvements that gentrification promises. It's not always clear who wins and loses when communities gentrify.

It would seem that white residents moving into segregated black and brown neighborhoods can only be positive for local schools, though, right? Those wealthier families' tax dollars must be, at least, invested in neighborhood schools. And when those families send their children to these schools, it has to improve the school services, which are then shared with their new neighbors, no?

Except, they aren't.

For those living outside of these neighborhoods, this might be gentrification's dirtiest little secret. For those of us who live in gentrifying neighborhoods, it's not a secret at all.

"There are many ways to opt out of the neighborhood schools and gentrification has a limited effect on public schools," said Mincere Keels, a University of Chicago professor who focuses on race and inequality.

The American dream is still alive: Survey

In the pursuit of the American dream, minority business owners often face an uphill battle. Often facing social and economic discrimination, the climb is tough. Despite the inevitable hurdles, minority entrepreneurs seem to be confident in what the future holds.

According to the Minority Business Development Agency, the rate at which minority-owned businesses are being formed continues to rise. The number of minority business enterprises increased 39 percent between 2007 and 2012 (from 5.8 million to 8.0 million), or more than three times faster than population growth among minorities, according to the Census Bureau's 2012 Survey of Business Owners. But they fall short in comparison to other businesses' overall success in terms of revenue and profit growth.

In response, President Obama's fiscal-year budget proposal for 2017 requests \$35.6 million for the MBDA to expand its services and assistance to the nation's 8 million minority businesses. This is an increase of \$3.6 million over FY 2016 appropriations.

As the country's population becomes more diverse, so too does its business sector. Latinoowned companies continue to boom, and firms owned by people from South Asia (India, Pakistan and Bangladesh) and East Asia (China, Korea, Japan and other Pacific Rim countries) are also expanding like never before. Black entrepreneurs are also thriving.

A recent Biz2Credit survey of more than 1,500 minority business owners from across the country in late March and early April asked for their opinions about the economy overall and their own prospects for success in 2016. The sample included Hispanics (59.9 percent), South Asians (19 percent), African Americans (14 percent) and East Asians (7.1 percent).

The gender breakdown was 78.3 percent male and 21.7 percent female. More than half of the respondents owned companies that were in business for two years or less. Greater than two-thirds of



them were sole proprietorships or LLCs.

The survey revealed that, surprisingly, most minority executives are positive about the direction of the U.S. economy, believing it will maintain its current expansion (38.3 percent) or grow faster than before (21.9 percent). Only 13.1 percent of these individuals believe another recession is on the horizon.

The respondents were even more confident about the health of their companies; more than three-quarters were somewhat confident or very confident in their upcoming prospects. Over half (57.5 percent) of them said they were very confident about the future health of their business, while nearly 1 in 5 (19.3 percent) were somewhat confident. Only 7.2 percent of the responses were pessimistic about their companies' chances of success in the coming year.

When asked about the challenges they faced, most of the worries were financial. The biggest concern was not being able to acquire adequate funding (36.3 percent).

Performance naturally played a role in the availability of capital. In September 2015, Biz2Credit conducted a study that showed Latino small-business loan applications grew 18 percent, yet their owners lag behind in the necessary factors needed to secure financing, such as annual revenue, age of business and credit scores.

The average annual revenue for Latino-owned businesses was \$68,540, trailing the average annual revenue of \$70,641 for non-Latino companies the year prior. The average age of Latino businesses was younger, at 22 months vs. 25 months, for non-Latino firms. Meanwhile, the



Paul Revere Williams Becomes First African American to Receive AIA Gold Medal

Paul Revere Williams

The American Institute of Architects (AIA), in a milestone announcement, selected Paul Revere Williams as its 2017 Gold Medal recipient, America's highest honor for an architect. In doing so Williams, who was awarded the prize posthumously, becomes the first African American to ever receive the honor, which has been awarded to 72 other architects, including Le Corbusier and Louis Kahn.

During the course of his career in Southern California, Williams designed more than 3,000 buildings including more than 2,000 homes for both the middleclass and for stars including Frank Sinatra, and Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz. Fluent in a wide range of architectural styles, he designed buildings that ran the gamut between historicist (all the rage in 1920s Hollywood) to Modern.

Williams achieved wide recognition and went on to become the AIA's first black member. But he still endured the hardships of working within racist spheres: Famously, Williams drew his renderings upside down, so that his predominantly white clientele could sit at a distance on the opposite side of the table.

The architect passed away in 1980 at the age of 85.

Several architects acknowledged the importance of this announcement at a time when the profession is being criticized for its lack of diversity.

"This is a moment in our Institute's history that is so important to recognize and acknowledge the work of a champion," said Phil Freelon of Perkins + Will. "It's been many decades but Paul Williams is finally being recognized for the brilliant work he did over many years."

Said architect William J. Bates, "Our profession desperately needs more architects like Paul Williams"

Meanwhile the AIA named Leddy Maytum Stacy Architects (LMSA) the winner of its annual Architecture Firm Award, which recognizes a practice that consistently has produced distinguished architecture for at least 10 years.

The San Francisco-based practice, founded by William Leddy, Marsha Maytum, and Richard Stacy in 1989, is known for its dedication to the environment, social equity, and historic preservation. Its projects encompass diverse building types, including affordable housing, university buildings, k-12 schools, and hospitality projects. The firm has

The Right Way to Think About Credit Lines for Business

Access to cash via a line of credit is an important safety net for a small business. Although there are various types of credit lines available, it is the flexibility it provides that makes it so popular among small business owners.

A line of credit is more like cash on demand for a set amount. You can draw funds up to the credit limit set when your company needs it, and you only pay interest on the funds you withdraw. Best of all, every dollar of principle you pay back becomes available for the company to use again.

The important thing to remember is credit lines for businesses have received an overhaul in the past several years. No longer is a credit line being issued just by banks down the road. Today, there are completely different lines of credit issued to businesses from alternative lenders rather than by banks alone. In addition, small business owners can also get credit lines secured by specific types of collateral such as equipment and accounts receivables.

Here's how I've learned to think about credit lines for business by following three simple rules.

Rule 1: Diversify your access to credit lines

When you rely on one bank or one type of credit line as the sole source of funding it may put your company at risk. When there is no backup plan if the company loses access to credit it can devastate a small operation. "A few years ago, losing a line of credit was a crisis - today, it's the new normal," says Marilyn Landis, a board member of the National Small Business Association in Washington, D.C.

Ask yourself right now what you'll do if your existing line of credit gets shut down or drastically reduced tomorrow. To combat this, you need to diversify your access to credit lines through banks and alternative lenders. Remember, the credit lines your company has access to will be there when you need it,



and you don't have to use it or pay for it if you don't. The National Federation of Independent Businesses says, "Think of it as an insurance policy that never needs to be paid until you need it."

Rule 2: Use your credit line for what it's good for

Recognize that credit lines provide an advantage over regular business loans. You only pay interest and fees on the portion of funds you use. If your credit line is for \$20k and you don't withdraw any

funds, you won't have any interest to pay. The entire \$20k is available for the business to use but you only make payments on the money you've actually used.

The fact is a credit line for a business is a much more affordable option to fund short-term finance needs, like buying inventory, paying business expenses, or purchasing new equipment compared to applying for a business loan.

Rule 3: Practice Self-Discipline

Stay on top of your payments when it comes to paying back the funds you used on your credit lines. The use of credit lines in the company's name provides the business an opportunity to establish a business credit rating – which can be very valuable for future financing. Although credit lines provide

Trends in Venture Capital, Angel Investments, and Crowdfunding across the Fifty Largest U.S. Metropolitan Areas

Annual Survey of Entrepreneurs Data Briefing Series

Using new data from the 2014 Annual Survey of Entrepreneurs (ASE), this data briefing looks across the largest fifty metropolitan statistical areas (MSAs) to see how entrepreneurs have fared in their quests to secure money from venture capitalists, angel investors, and online crowds.

Venture Capital Received when Starting a Business:

While 10.3 percent of entrepreneurs report using personal credit cards when starting their business, nationally, only 0.6 percent initially received venture capital.

• The metros with the highest percentage of firms receiving venture capital funding when starting include: San Jose, CA (2.4%), San Francisco,

CA (1.5%), Salt Lake City, UT (1.3%), Austin, TX (1.2%), Baltimore (1.1%), Birmingham, AL (1.1%), and Nashville, TN (1.1%).

• The metros at the bottom include: Chicago, IL (0.4%), Detroit, MI (0.4%), Jacksonville, FL (0.4%), New Orleans, LA (0.4%), Orlando, FL (0.4%), Washington, D.C. (0.4), Virginia Beach, VA (0.3%), and Cleveland, OH (0.2%).

Venture Capital Investment Trends across MSAs:

In 2014, roughly \$68 billion was invested in venture capital deals in the United States and, 7,878 employer businesses reported receiving VC funds. Thirty percent of those recipients were located in just four metro areas: New York, Los Angeles, San Francisco, and Boston. The national average was 0.2%.

 Metro areas that rank highly in terms of those venture funding success rates include: San Francisco, CA (0.8%), San Jose, CA (0.8%), Boston, MA (0.5%), Hartford, CT (0.5%), Memphis, TN (0.4%), Minnepolis, MN (0.4%), Philadelphia, PA, (0.4%), Richmond, VA (0.4%), Washington, D.C. (0.4%).

 At 0.1 percent, the lowest ranked metros include: Baltimore. MD, Denver.CO, Jacksonville, FL, Las Vegas, NV, Orlando, FL, Riverside, CA, Tampa, FL.

Angel Investment Trends across MSAs:

Nationally, 8,900 firms (0.2%) received angel investments in 2014. Among firms that received the full amount they sought from angel investors, again, 30 percent were in just four MSAs.

- Metropolitan areas with the highest success rates
 of firms receiving the full amount of angel investments they sought include: San Jose, CA (1.0%),
 San Francisco, CA (0.7%), Boston, MA (0.5%),
 Los Angeles, CA (0.4%), Austin, TX (0.4%), and
 Charlotte, NC (0.4%). Metros at the bottom include Detroit, Cleveland, and Chicago.
- The metros at the bottom include: Chicago, IL, Cleveland, OH, Detroit, MI. Fifteen other metros have a rate of 0.2%.

Crowdfunding Investment Trends across MSAs:

With a national average rate of 0.1 percent, crowdfunding success rates, were lower than that for VC and angel funds. Again, four MSAs—New York, Los Angeles, San Francisco, and Washington, D.C.—accounted for 28 percent of firms that received all the money they sought from crowdfunding sources.

- At 0.3%, the top MSAs for crowdfunding success in 2014 are: San Francisco, CA, San Jose, CA, Washington, D.C., Charlotte, NC, Las Vegas, CA, Memphis, TN, Minneapolis, MN, Oklahoma City, OK, and Raleigh, NC.
- At 0.1 percent, the metros at the bottom include: San Diego, CA, Riverside, CA, Pittsburgh, PA, Orlando, FL, Kansas City, MO-KS, and Chicago, IL.

average credit score for Latino-owned businesses applying for loans was 603, compared to 614 for all others.

Our research shows that for years, minority entrepreneurs have had a tougher time securing capital than other groups. When looking to launch businesses, they often faced tighter lending standards and had to visit multiple banks to find willing lenders. Technology has helped level the playing field and made the process easier. Visiting banks required having to overcome language barriers, cultural issues and potential biases. By applying for loans online, Latinos, Asians and African Americans can let their performance speak for them when they submit online funding requests.

The good news is that lenders have opened the spigot in the past few years, and more capital is flowing to companies than it did during the Great Recession. Many lenders are in the game: big banks (\$10 billion-plus in assets), smaller, regional banks, credit unions, alternative lenders and, increasingly, institutional investors who buy loans on marketplace lending platforms.

Borrowers, bolstered by solid post-session performances and enticed by record-low interest rates, have begun to have an easier time securing financing. According to the most recent Biz2Credit Small Business Lending Index, big banks are granting a higher percentage of loan requests than at any time since the mid 2000s. Further, institutional investors in search of high-yield investment vehicles are increasingly doing small-business finance deals and have become important players in the small-business credit marketplace during the past two years.

Maintaining profitability was a concern for 15.2 percent of respondents. It is the most important thing for any business, regardless of the ethnicity of the owner. Many of the company owners who participated in the study have been operating three years or less. The early years are often a trial-and-error period. We have seen a boom in minority-owned businesses, particularly in the Latino and immigrant communities. By nature, immigrants are risk-takers. They are optimistic and committed to succeed. For them failure is not an option.

Growing revenues was the biggest worry of 11.4 percent of the business owners surveyed. Other concerns included not having enough skilled workers, high health-care costs, labor turnover, taxes and regulation.


So how do minority small-business owners plan to prosper and grow their companies?


Our research reveals that many are focusing on using the internet to help expand their enterprises. They also plan to increase capital spending, hire more workers and expand their facilities. These activities require infusions of cash.


Fortunately, the SBA has numerous programs in place to help minority-owned businesses and companies that are started in economic empowerment zones. Micro-lenders, often not-for-profit, have a mission to provide funding to minority entrepreneurs. Additionally, it has not hurt that the overall U.S. economy has been on a slow but steady rebound. After a near shutdown of small-business lending during the Great Recession, banks and others have opened up the vaults again.

We really should not be surprised by the optimism reported by minority business owners.

many benefits, their downside is accumulating debt which can lead to costly interest in the long term. While debt can definitely be a useful tool for certain aspects of a business, business owners need to make sure their debt is working for them and not against them.

On a final note, it's essential to understand that credit lines for businesses are constantly evolving and changing. Sometimes unexpectedly. That doesn't mean you need to go along with every funding option. Do your research and outweigh the pros and cons of each credit line product. Develop a diversity of access to credit lines for your business, and leave the anxiety and fear behind.

Interest rates remain low, unemployment hovers around 5 percent, jobs are being added to the economy, and low gas prices have cut the cost of doing business. "Many of the policies of urban education are focused around bringing upper-income families back into the public school system based on the assumptions that they will come into these neighborhoods and invest in the neighborhood schools and revitalize both the neighborhoods and schools," she said. "But families that move into neighborhoods that are low-income often opt out of the neighborhood schools and these higher income families take their individual household resources with them and contribute them to" other schools.

Keels, along with researchers from Brown and Cornell universities, published a study in 2013 that looked at whether schools in gentrifying Chicago neighborhoods saw benefits, including improved academics and more economic diversity. They did not.

"These schools remain uninfluenced by gentrifying families," the study concluded.

Alten Construction relies on local Sonoma County subcontractors to complete Fleet and Materials Lab facility

Construction on Sonoma County's new Fleet and Materials Lab facility was recently completed by Alten Construction (AltenConstruction.com), a full-service San Francisco Bay area commercial construction company.
