2017's Best Cities for Hispanic Entrepreneurs

Expect the Hispanic and Latino community's contributions to the U.S. economy to be nothing short of monumental in the coming decades. Not only is this demographic expected to make up a third of the U.S. population by 2050 — translating into immense buying power — this group is also creating businesses at 15 times the national rate, according to one report.

The timing therefore could not be more appropriate for Hispanic entrepreneurs to bring their business ideas to fruition. But where is the most fertile ground for a Hispanic-owned enterprise? To answer that question, WalletHub's analysts compared the 150 largest U.S. cities across 21 key indicators of business friendliness toward Hispanic entrepreneurs. Our data set of 21 key metrics ranges from Hispanic entrepreneurship rate to median annual income of Hispanics to share of Hispanics with at least a bachelor's degree. Read on for our findings, expert business insight from a panel of researchers and a full description of our methodology.

Methodology

In order to determine the best cities for Hispanic entrepreneurs, WalletHub's analysts compared the 150 most populated U.S. cities across two key dimensions, namely "Hispanic Business-Friend-liness" and "Hispanic Purchasing Power." Our

sample considers only the city proper in each case and excludes cities in the surrounding metro area.

We evaluated the two dimensions using 21 relevant metrics, which are listed below with their corresponding weights. Each metric was graded on a 100-point scale, with a score of 100 representing the most favorable conditions for Hispanic entrepreneurs. Data for metrics marked with an asterisk (*) were available at only the state level.

We then calculated the total score for each city based on its weighted average across all metrics and used the resulting scores to construct our final ranking.

California Takes Top Three Spots in Employment Growth Among Large Counties, Census Bureau Reports

San Francisco, Riverside and San Bernardino led the nation in annual employment growth among the top 50 U.S. counties with the most employees, according to new U.S. Census Bureau economic statistics released today. Overall, these 50 counties accounted for 34.6 percent of employment of all establishments defined by the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS).

San Francisco County, first for the second year in a row, saw its employment grow 6.6 percent from 2014 to 2015, up 37,843 employees to 611,140 employees. The information sector (NAICS 51), up 13.3 percent to 64,223 employees, led growth in that county. San Francisco also led the top 10 largest counties in annual payroll increase, climbing 12.1 percent to \$59.3 billion.

Riverside County saw its employment grow 4.9 percent, up 25,284 employees to 540,169 employees in 2015. San Bernardino County's employment grew 4.4 percent, up 24,396 employees to 578,755 employees in 2015. Santa Clara County's employment grew 3.8 percent, up 36,807 employees to 999,906 employees in 2015.

Transportation and Warehousing Sees Large Gains in Two California Counties

Some of the top counties saw the Transportation and Warehousing sector (NAICS 48-49) driving their growth. In Riverside County, transportation and warehousing employment increased 32.3 percent, up 6,865 employees and San Bernardino County saw an increase in employment of 16.2 percent, up 8,125 employees in this sector.

Two other sectors had multiple appearances in the top 10 counties. Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services sector (NAICS 54) was the top sector in Suffolk County, Mass., with an employment increase of 12.0 percent. Hillsborough County, Fla., had an 8.8 percent increase in this sector. Retail Trade (NAICS 44-45) was the top sector in Salt Lake County, Utah, with an employment increase of 7.3 percent. It was also the top sector in Broward County, Fla., with an employment increase of 4.2 percent.

These latest data come from the 2015 County Business Patterns, which provides the only detailed annual information on the number of establishments, employees, and first quarter and annual payroll at the national, state, county, metropolitan, congressional district and five-digit ZIP code levels for nearly 1,200 industries.

National Highlights

- Nationally, the number of establishments increased 1.3 percent to 7.7 million in 2015. Employment rose 2.5 percent to 124.1 million employees in 2015, from 121.1 million in 2014.
- Annual payroll was up 5.3 percent, from \$5.9 trillion in 2014 to \$6.3 trillion in 2015.

State and County Highlights

- California had more establishments (908,120) and employees (14.3 million) and a larger annual payroll (\$857 billion) than any other state in 2015. Texas followed in each measure (569,091 establishments, 10.2 million employees and \$521.1 billion in annual payroll). New York ranked third in all three measures: 540,298 establishments, 8.0 million employees and \$513.1 billion in annual payroll.
- Utah had the highest employment growth rate at 4.9 percent. The Transportation and Warehousing sector (NAICS 48-49) led growth in that state, up 20.3 percent to 58,453 employees.
- Los Angeles County, Calif., led all counties in the number of establishments (265,112) and employees (4.0 million); followed by Cook County, Ill., in both measures (132,237 establishments and 2.4 million employees).
- New York County, N.Y. (Manhattan), topped all counties in annual payroll with \$239.3 billion, while ranking third in establishments (105,444) and employees (2.2 million).
- Wayne County, Mich., rounded out the top 10 large counties, with an employment increase of 3.6 percent (up 21,650 employees), led by the Manufacturing sector (NAICS 31-33) where employment increased 8.4 percent. The leading subsector was Transportation Equipment Manufacturing (NAICS 336), in which employment increased 10.8 percent.

USBC and BYPO Partner to Assist Black Businesses With Growth and Sustainability

Entrepreneurs of color could soon get help with everything—from obtaining financing to finding customers—courtesy of two prominent business groups.

A new effort to build business ownership in the black community stems from a memorandum of understanding between the U.S. Black Chambers Inc. and the Black Young Presidents' Organization.

The MOU has been signed by Black Chambers' President Ron Busby, Sr. and Brian Hall, chairman of BYPO, a part of the Young Presidents' Organization. With member-run firms employing 15 million people and \$6 trillion in annual revenue, YPO claims it is one of the world's most influential group of business leaders.

The agreement established a blueprint for an ongoing alliance and collaboration between the USBC and BYPO. It aims to determine proactive measures to best support the growth and sustainability of black businesses. The partnership's main focus is to provide new opportunities and a wider pipeline for black entrepreneurs to get access to capital to grow their businesses they don't currently have.

"Successful and sustainable black businesses are directly related to establishing wealth in the black community," Busby says. "Our partnership with BYPO is an important step in providing continued leadership and advocacy in the fulfillment of economic empowerment."

Commenting on the agreement, Hall says, "Entrepreneurs and small businesses will only become and remain successful if we work collectively with federal government agencies that can serve as vehicles to access capital, identify opportunities to mentor younger businesses, and build actionable succession plans."

Busby says the groups anticipate initially targeting 25 to 50 businesses with the launch of the agreement, including more as networks are built and other resources established to formalize the program strategy and implementation.

He provided a preliminary sketch of how the USBC and BYPO will support the growth and sustainability of black businesses.

 Working to identify opportunities for mentorship, subcontracting, and guidance on joint ventures, and strategic alliances that help businesses scale for growth.

- Providing black businesses with access to lending options through banking networks the USBC and BYPO has ties with, to gain to access to capital
- Developing lists of qualified subcontractors to share with black businesses to generate new business opportunities. Busby initiatives like Bank Black, the Black Chambers' credit card program with Liberty Bank, and the USBC Entrepreneurial Training Program powered by the University of Phoenix will be used to directly connect businesses to banks interested in providing access to capital.
- Connecting black firms to Millennial Entrepreneurs Redefined and Capital Pathways, two current USBC programs. Busby says those programs, along with the Minority Business Development Agency, are geared to preparing small, medium, and large firms, including start-ups, with resources, direct connections to lenders, investors, and contractors in ten cities.

County Business Patterns excludes business owners who were self-employed (i.e., nonemployers), employees of private households, railroad employees, agriculture production workers and most government employees. The statistics are broken down according to employment-size classes (e.g., number of establishments with one to four employees) and legal form of organization, such as corporations and partnerships. Definitional and coverage differences may affect the direct comparison of economic census data and County Business Patterns data. See the program methodology for more details.

Information on businesses without paid employees will be released as part of the upcoming 2015 Nonemployer Statistics report in May 2017.

County Business Patterns data are also available for Puerto Rico, Guam, American Samoa, the

Commonwealth of Northern Mariana Islands and the U.S. Virgin Islands.

County Business Patterns debuted 71 years ago and has been published annually for the past 51 years.

The Color of Tech

Evelyn Boyd Granville



Evelyn Boyd Granville

Evelyn Boyd Granville (born May 1, 1924) was the second African-American woman to receive a Ph.D. in mathematics from an American University; she earned it in 1949 from Yale University (Attended Smith College before Yale).

Education

Evelyn Boyd was born in Washington, D.C.; her father worked odd jobs due to the Great Depression but separated from her mother when Boyd was young. Boyd and her older sister were raised by her mother and aunt, who both worked at the Bureau of Engraving and Printing. She was valedictorian at Dunbar High School, which at that time was a segregated but academically competitive school for black students in Washington.With financial support from her aunt and, later, a small partial scholarship from Phi Delta Kappa, Boyd entered Smith College in the fall of 1941. She majored in mathematics and physics, but also took a keen interest in astronomy. She was elected to Phi Beta Kappa and to Sigma Xi and graduated summa cum laude in 1945. Encouraged by a graduate scholarship from the Smith Student Aid Society of Smith College, she applied to graduate programs in mathematics and was accepted by both Yale University and the University of Michigan; she chose Yale because of the financial aid they offered. There she studied functional analysis under the supervision of Einar Hille, finishing her doctorate in 1949. Her dissertation was "On Laguerre Series in the Complex Domain".

Career

In 1950, she took a teaching position at Fisk University, a college for black students in Nashville, Tennessee (more prestigious postings being unavailable to black women). Two of her students there, Vivienne Malone-Mayes and Etta Zuber Falconer, went on to earn doctorates in mathematics of their own. But by 1952 she left academia and returned to Washington with a position at the Diamond Ordnance Fuze Laboratories. After four years there she moved to IBM as a computer programmer; at IBM, she moved from Washington to New York City in 1957

She married the Reverend Gamaliel Mansfield Collins in 1960 and with him moved to Los Angeles, where she worked for the U.S. Space Technology Laboratories, then in 1962 the North American Aviation Space and Information Systems Division. While there she worked on various projects for the Apollo program, including celestial mechanics, trajectory comuptation, and "digital computer techniques". In 1967, Granville's marriage ended in divorce

Forced to move because of a restructuring at IBM, she took a position at California State University, Los Angeles in 1967 as a full professor of mathematics. She married realtor Edward V. Granville in 1970. After retiring from CSULA in 1984 she taught at Texas College in Tyler, Texas for four years, and then in 1990 joined the faculty of the University of Texas at Tyler as the Sam A. Lindsey Professor of mathematics. There she developed elementary school math enrichment programs. Since 1967, Granville has remained a strong advocate for women's education in tech.

Awards and honors

In 1989, she was awarded an honorary doctorate by Smith College, the first one given by an American institution to an African-American woman mathematician. In 2006 she was awarded an honorary degree by Spelman College.

She was appointed to the Sam A. Lindsey Chair of the University of Texas at Tyler (1990-1991).

In 1999, the United States National Academy of Sciences inducted her into its Portrait Collection of African-Americans in Science.

Charles Wang

Charles Wang is the world's first Asian software tycoon. As a young man with a degree from a humble community college in Queens and a naive determination to enter a new field called "programming", in 1976 Wang and a partner secured the exclusive Noth American right to sell licenses to a Swiss disk operating system. The software's novel sorting routine gave it a significant speed advantage. It proved crtical in an age when primitive vaccuum-tube mainframes strained to process every byte of data. Wang's Computer Associates grew at breakneck pace. By the early 1980s the only serious rival on the independent software landscape was Bill Gates and a little company called Microsoft.

The eventual success of the Windows operating system let Microsoft pull ahead by the early 1990s, but Charles Wang didn't take the challenge lying down. He accelerated an already

voracious acquisition strategy. By 1998 Computer Associates reached \$25-billion in market capitalization. Wang wasn't shy about flaunting his wealth. He bought the New York Islanders hockey team and became a leading light on the international charity circuit. Wang's flambuoyant ways raised eyebrows when CA shares tumbled soon after he exercised stock options that let him pocket a cool \$700 million in May 1998. Under shareholder pressure, in 2002 Wang turned over full control of the company to protegé Sanjay Kumar.

Charles Wang was born in 1944 in Shanghai where his father was a justice of the Supreme Court. The family moved to New York when Charles was 8. His first part-time job was sorting mail at a local post office. Graduating from Queens College in 1967, he picked a career out of the classifieds. "There were two and a half pages of

programmer ads," he recalls. "So I told my mother, 'I think I'm going to be a programmer.' She says, 'What's that?' I said, 'I don't know, Mom, but boy, do they need 'em!"

Computer Associates

Charles Wang and partner Russell Artzt established Computer Associates in 1976, guiding the company toward its current standing as one of the largest independent software corporations in the world. One year later, Computer Associates became the first enterprise software company to provide multi-platform products, foreshadowing its ongoing emphasis on compatibility and integration. By 1989, Computer Associates became the first software company to reach \$1 billion in revenues.

Wang's tenure as CEO of Computer Associates was marked by rapid growth, frequently as a result of strict hiring practices and high expectations for executives of acquired companies. Nearly all of CA's managers were promoted from within, so very few acquired managers were kept. Newly hired salespeople had some sales experience, but not in software. It was unusual for a technician to be considered for sales because CA's training program was geared toward products instead of professional selling. The pass/fail demarcation was sharp, so perceived inadequate sales performance meant termination. All told, Wang engaged in several dozen acquisitions and those acquired facilities were repopulated with CA employees.
