SBA Launches 3rd Annual Growth Accelerator Fund Competition to Award \$3.95 Million for Small Business Startups

For the third year, the U.S. Small Business Ad-ministration (SBA) is launching an Growth Accel-erator Fund competition for accelerators and other entrepreneurial ecosystem models to compete for monetary prizes of \$50,000 each, totaling \$3.95 million. The application period is from May 2-June 3 and information about the application process can be found at: www.sba.gov/accelerators or www.challenge.gov.

"As we celebrate National Small Business Week this week, it is only fitting that we launch our third annual Growth Accelerator Fund competition to empower more of America's small businesses," said Mark Walsh, Associate Administrator for the Office of Investment and Innovation. "Accelerators provide valuable resources to potential startups: a physical infrastructure to work in their infancy, mentoring, business-plan assistance, networking, opportunities to obtain venture capital, and in troductions to potential customers, partners and suppliers-all critical elements to ensuring that small businesses flourish and succeed. Last year's competition was so successful, we've added more federal partners including our very own Office of Native American Affairs and Office of Veterans Business Development to help bring more Native-American-owned, veteran-owned, women-owned and minority-owned small businesses into the fold

New to this year's competition, SBA is partnering with several other federal agencies -- National Institutes of Health (NIH), National Science Foundation (NSF), Department of Education (DoED) and Department of Agriculture (USDA) -- to provide additional prizes to accelerators that assist entrepreneurs with submitting proposals for the Small Business Innovation (SBIR) and Small Business Technology Transfer (STTR) programs. SBA's Office of Investment and Innovation (OII) is also partnering with the Inter-American Devel-opment Bank to provide prizes to U.S. accelerators that assist the African descendant start-up community in Latin America and the Caribbean. Special

consideration will be given to these accelerator models which support women-owned or minority-owned small businesses.

Similar to last year's competition, several panels containing expert judges from the private and public sector with collective experience in early stage investing, entrepreneurship, academia, start-ups and economic development will select the winners. The competition includes accelerators, incubators, co-working startup communities, shared tinker-spaces or other models. The panel will give particular attention to applicants that fill geographic gaps in the accelerator and entrepreneurial ecosystem space.

Through this competition, the SBA is looking to support the development of accelerators and their support of startups in parts of the country where there are fewer conventional sources of access to capital (i.e., venture capital and other investors).

In addition, the SBA is also seeking accelerators headed by women and those who support them or other underrepresented groups, 44 percent of last year's accelerator winners were run by women and 41 percent were classified as underrepresented groups.

Special consideration will be given to manufacturing accelerator models and models which support the White House Power Initiative during this year's competition, because they are critical to job growth and strengthening the nation's economy.

Technology and Business Could Bring a Little Hope

Money was once famously described as the root of all evil, a notion that probably would not have gone down well at the recent Forbes Under 30 Summit at Jerusalem's Israel Museum. Amidst the shoulder-rubbing of the attendant rich and successful entrepreneurs, a distinctive note of philanthropy through innovation could be detected. Not only could new technologies resolve existing problems, but young Israeli and Palestinian business people could cross boundaries where their political counterparts had failed, attendees said.

Billed as "a day of inspiration and problem solving," the summit put together by Forbes business magazine was aimed at entrepreneurs yet to reach their fourth decade. The choice of seating -beanbags and sun-loungers – and the tone of the opening addresses, including a discussion of hip-hop and open-mike poetry, were clearly aimed at the younger crowd, but the message was anything but frivolous or flippant. Many of the attendees had founded more than one start-up already; the issues addressed ranged from the deadly Ebola virus and global energy needs, to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

Jessica O. Matthews, a speaker at the conference who had travelled to Jerusalem from New York, was typical of the conference entrepreneurs, combining business sense with innovative ideas to help people. Her company, Uncharted Play, is a consumer-energy enterprise with a twist. "We're a little different from normal energy companies because we want to change not only the way that people generate energy, but also the way in which they consume energy," the founder and CEO told The Media Line.

The concept behind Matthew's company is simple, but could potentially impact on the lives of millions of people across the globe. Everyday kids' toys – a soccer ball or a skipping rope – have been adapted to "harness the kinetic energy of motion generated during normal play, (so that they) can be used as an off-grid power source for lighting and other small electronics." Miniaturized and low-cost energy generating systems are able to capture otherwise wasted kinetic energy, but the twist comes when the technology is applied to other common items, not just those used for play. Imagine charging your phone by pushing your child's stroller. In the developed world this might merely be a convenience, but in developing nations where a constant supply of electricity is not a given, such technologies could mean real improvements in people's lives. Matthews pointed to the way populations in under-developed countries adapted the emerging mobile phone technology to access the now ubiquitous internet. "Landlines weren't cutting it so people just got cellphones and now that's the status quo," she said.

Eventually it should be possible to build generators so cheaply that they can be placed in any manner of object, Matthews explained, adding, "I envisage a world where our technology is built into everything." This could contribute to democratizing people's energy needs, the CEO said, suggesting it would complement, and not replace, other existing renewable energy sources.

Matan Berkowitz, another of the event's keyspeakers, showcased a new technology that he believes will improve people's lives. With a background in music and film he has created a company called Shift which aims to use technology to make music accessible to all. Demonstrating <text><text><text><text><text>

one of his products, Berkowitz played music on stage using a sensor attached to his hand and connected to a computer. The technology would allow disabled people – those with amputations or who are blind or paralyzed – to create music, and could even be applied in therapy and children's learning, the founder and CEO told The Media Line. "At the center is the idea of making music as accessible to as many people as possible. Music has a very strong symbolism in the way it allows us to express ourselves freely," Berkowitz said.

But technology was not the only medium discussed through which global improvement might be effected. The conference also focused on ways of dealing with the ongoing Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Bassel Sader, a 20-yearold Palestinian studying law at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, said business might be able to succeed where the Israeli and Palestinian leadership had not. "Politics is politics, so you have to be able to say one thing, do another and mean a third thing. Whereas business has no religion and no nationality, it's just business, making money," Sader told The Media Line.

Economic Development

In Growing Economies, Some People Are Left Behind

Despite recent growth in jobs and economic prosperity, a new report finds most low-income workers haven't benefited.

By most measures, metro areas such as Austin, Texas; Nashville, Tenn.; and Raleigh, N.C.; have enjoyed some of the strongest economic growth in recent years. The resulting prosperity, however, isn't spreading across all segments of the workforce, particularly to the lower rungs of the economic ladder.

These three regions and others have enjoyed strong job gains but earned low marks on measures of economic inclusion in a Brookings Institution report released Thursday. The study, while assessing overall growth and prosperity, also examines the extent to which standards of living have improved for all people within metro areas.

"Many places are becoming more prosperous," said Richard Shearer, a senior research analyst at Brookings who co-authored the report. "Whether or not that benefits people in the bottom half of the distribution is the key piece that is missing in a lot of places."

Brookings ranked the 100 largest metro areas using a series of indicators in four areas: economic growth, prosperity, economic inclusion and inclusion by race. Most metro areas registered gains in economic growth and prosperity, but few improved on measures of inclusion, which considered median wages, employment-to-population ratios and relative income poverty rates (the share of the population earning less than half the local median wage). Between 2009 and 2014, only eight metro areas improved on all three inclusion indicators: Charleston, S.C.; Chicago; Dayton, Ohio; Denver; Provo and Salt Lake City, Utah; San Jose, Calif.; and Tulsa, Okla.

Consider the Austin metro area: It recorded the strongest growth nationally in both total jobs and gross metropolitan product. At the same time, its inflation-adjusted median wage still declined and the relative income poverty rate climbed faster than in all but 18 other areas.

As one would expect, increases in productivity coincided with climbing average annual wages across metro areas. Interestingly, however, the report found no relationship between changes in median wages and relative income poverty -- two indicators of inclusion. Of the 20 metro areas recording median wage increases from 2009 to 2014, just eight of them experienced drops in relative income poverty rates. Shearer said this finding suggests middle-class economic gains don't necessarily translate to better outcomes for those in the bottom tier of the income distribution.

Areas with the largest declines in economic inclusion are mostly concentrated in the Sun Belt. Some of these economies are largely comprised of low-wage jobs in the retail, hospitality and food service sectors. Others were hit hard by the bursting of the housing bubble and still haven't fully recovered.

"These places are struggling to move their economies away from housing and construction to more durable sources of growth," said Shearer.

It's important to note that the study compared metro areas' rates of change for each indicator, not their ending levels. High rankings for inclusiveness also don't necessarily mean that such areas are more inclusive, as some incurred greater losses during the recession or started to decline long before 2009.


Disparities across racial and ethnic groups also worsened throughout much of the country's larger urban regions. In the majority of metro areas reviewed, gaps in median wages and relative income poverty for whites and minorities widened. Improvements in overall economic inclusion didn't translate to gains for racial and ethnic minorities, either. In fact, many areas posting the best outcomes for overall inclusion recorded some of the largest declines in racial and ethnic inclusion. This often played out in the Great Lakes region in places like Cleveland, where real median wages for whites increased but declined 7 percent for other racial groups.

Meanwhile, disparities often narrowed in areas where overall inclusion indicators plummeted. This was the case in Las Vegas and parts of the Southeast. Shrinking gaps on measures of economic inclusion typically didn't point to any gains for minorities, but rather deteriorating outcomes for whites, said Shearer.

Nearly all metropolitan economies grew between 2009 and 2014. Gains in prosperity, though, were somewhat harder to come by. Just 63 of the 100 metro areas reviewed experienced increases in average annual wages, productivity and the standard of living. Areas benefiting from strong tech or professional services sectors performed particularly well, according to the report.

Improvements in all facets of the economy remained elusive. Only two metro areas, San Jose and Houston, recorded above-average improvements in all areas reviewed (including inclusion by race) over the short-, medium- and long-term.

Individual industries fueling regional economies largely dictate how they perform, as shown by the rapid growth of several energy and tech-supported regions. Demographics, too, play a major role in overall outcomes.

Another factor, of course, are policies that either promote or hinder economic inclusion -- an area policymakers can't ignore if they want to improve prospects for all workers.

"Increases in growth and prosperity are not enough to move the dial on inclusion, or inclusion by race." said Shearer. "Leaders need to have economic strategies that go beyond focusing on growth and prosperity.'

In the past economics has been able to turn enemies into allies and it could do so again, he said, pointing to the economic cooperation between France and Germany in the decades after the Second World War which led to the creation of the European Union.

Sader clearly knows a thing or two about business. Although he is 20-years old, in his spare time he runs his own app, Azmeh (meaning congestion in Arabic), a program designed to help Palestinians avoid the congestion at Israeli checkpoints. "On the app you can see all the checkpoints that are in and around the West Bank, you can see if there is traffic or military clashes, or if searches are going on at the checkpoints," he said.

Communications technology that bypass national boundaries are part of the process (of conflict resolution), Moriya Rosenberg, another speaker and a member of YaLa, told The Media Line. Using online educational courses YaLa encourages communication and citizens' journalism; some of its greatest successes have been in creating dialogue between people in Israel, the Palestinian Territories, and other parts of the Middle East and North Africa, Rosenberg explained.

The biggest success is seeing people after they've engaged in our courses (and watching them) dive into the action ... it might be the first time they've ever met an Arab or a Jew and you see their fear really break down," she said



Why Access to Capital Still Matters

A. Shuanise Washington, President and CEO of the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation discusses the importance of access to capital for minority-owned businesses.

The lack of access to capital is one of the gravest threats confronting minority-owned businesses and one that has deprived minority communities of their own source of wealth and jobs.

Capital is, in fact, the very lifeblood of business. It helps maintain cash flow, particularly in lean periods when profits are low. More than that, it enables businesses to make investments that are essential to growth: expanding facilities, buying new equipment and technology that improve offerings, replenishing inventory, and establishing a credit history for future borrowing.

The barriers to capital that minority business owners face are due to a number of factors, including size and type of business, broader economic conditions and the lack of strong social capital (i.e., strategic business relationships, mentors, professional connections and financial networks needed when establishing and building a business.)

Consider this, for example: because many minority-owned businesses tend to be relatively small, they rely on credit from traditional financial institutions like banks, whereas large corporations have access to capital markets for their financing needs.

But beginning with the financial crisis, banks drastically tightened their lending standards, making it more difficult for many small businesses to secure loans. And for minority-owned businesses, it has been especially hard. Black and Hispanic business owners, for example, were less likely to have their loan applications approved, compared with their white counterparts who shared similar business profiles, including credit score, according to a study published in April 2013 by the Small Business Administration's Office of Advocacy.

The problem, should it be allowed to fester, has ramifications beyond communities of color. Minority-owned firms are key contributors to the U.S. economy. In less than ten years, minority businesses in the U.S. have increased by 38%, topping an impressive 8 million since 2007, according to the Minority Business Development Agency (MDBA).

Tellingly, young minority firms create jobs at similar rates as young non-minority firms. But perhaps most important, minority firms are the lifeline for many minority communities that suffer from high rates of unemployment and joblessness.

And the opportunity for growth is striking. Minority-owned firms are poised to play a major role in American export growth, with MBDA recently describing them as a "key component of U.S. international trade."

Given all this, our nation's leaders must recognize that access to capital for minority-owned businesses is a policy issue that we must address if we hope to lift communities from economic despair, spur innovation, create jobs and propel the U.S. economy to greater heights.

In that context, the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation, Incorporated (CBCF) is bringing its Executive Economic Summit series to Berkeley next month. The summit, entitled 'Capital Wealth Creation in Business and Technology' will convene some of the nation's top business and technology leaders—like Reed Hastings, the CEO of Netflix—and key members of the Congressional Black Caucus, California State Legislature and the Obama administration to discuss strategies for expanding capital access for minority-owned firms in the technology sector. PayPal Pays Out \$1 Billion In Small Business Loans

Working Capital program helps those having trouble with traditional bank loans

Gustav Reyes, owner of Chicago-based Simply Wood Rings, is an artist who found a way to turn his passion into a successful business. He started selling his handcrafted wooden wedding rings through his website in 2005, and has processed payments with PayPal from the beginning. While his business grew steadily over the years, his sales began to drop in 2014.

To secure funding to update his website, he turned to PayPal Working Capital, knowing from past experience how hard it is to get a loan.

"PayPal knew I generated the revenue and our business was viable. Traditional banks just didn't see that," he said, according to PayPal's website. Not to mention the paperwork for applying for a loan is daunting.

PayPal CEO Dan Schulman recently announced that PayPal Working Capital has provided more than \$1 billion in funding in the U.S., UK, and Australia to help more than 60,000 small business owners like Gustav grow their businesses and realize their dreams. "Since late 2013 we've been providing access to working capital to small businesses through PayPal Working Capital. Pay-Pal is now lending \$100 million per month to businesses."

PayPal loans have proven to be beneficial to small business owners who have had trouble being approved for loans by traditional commercial banks. Because the program uses a company's total sales and history using PayPal's payment system, there is no credit check or extensive documentation required. According Schulman, "daily issuance now exceeds \$3 million; we've more than tripled the pace from a year ago. More than 60,000 unique merchants have used this program to date – an increase of 150% year over year."

Financing continues to be a stumbling block for entrepreneurs, particularly African American owned businesses, with uncertain income and nonexistent or blemished credit.
