## Senator Roth's Proposal to Protect Small Businesses, Ensure ADA Compliance Passes Senate on Bipartisan, Unanimous Vote

Senator Richard D. Roth's (D-Riverside) proposal to protect California's small businesses and the disabled community was approved by the California State Senate today on a bipartisan, unanimous vote of 40-0.

"I thank my colleagues for recognizing the importance of Senate Bill 251 in ensuring access for the disabled community by incentivizing compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act," said Senator Roth. "SB 251 is a critical step in guaranteeing access for disabled Californians by providing small businesses with the tools and resources necessary to comply with often changing and at times complex disability access laws."

The Legislature has attempted to reform ADA access laws and regulations over the past decade, with the most recent and substantial measure being Senate Bill 1186 (2012) by former Senate President pro Tem Darrell Steinberg (D-Sacramento) and former Senator Robert Dutton (R-Rancho Cucamonga). While SB 1186 created important policies regarding Certified Access Specialists (CASPs) and compliance notification, there remain significant barriers to ensuring small businesses have the resources and tools necessary to maintain compliance with state and federal disability access laws. As a result, many businesses throughout California have found themselves out of compliance with the law. This

situation has prevented Californians in the disability community from having full and equal access to facilities and services.

Supported by the California Chamber of Commerce as a "job creator," SB 251 is a narrowly crafted provision to provide businesses with much needed disability access education, resources and training, and allows small businesses that have been proactive in identifying access issues a reasonable amount of time to fix any problems identified before a lawsuit arises. SB 251 also provides small business owners with tax incentives to fix ADA compliance issues in an attempt to ensure full and fair access for all Californians.

Senator Roth said: "Over the years, Washington and Sacramento have been good at creating new ADA enforcement rules but have not been so good at educating and training business owners on how to comply. SB 251 is a common sense approach to protecting both small businesses as well as the rights of the disabled, and I look forward to working with my colleagues in the Assembly as the bill moves forward."

SB 251 now moves to the State Assembly for consideration.

## Over \$29 Million to Small Businesses Working on High-Speed Rail

The California High-Speed Rail Authority (Authority) is providing a major boost to California small businesses. In the second quarter of the Fiscal Year 2014-15, the Authority executed nine new prime contracts that include commitments from 21 certified small businesses to work on high-speed rail.

From Redding to San Diego, small businesses across the state are providing key professional and construction services, that have resulted in more than \$17 million pumped into small businesses over the three-month period. In the Central Valley

region, where work is underway, there are 65 small businesses working on the first construction segment with \$307 million committed. This includes 21 Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBE) and 7 Disabled Veteran Business Enterprises (DVBE). Out of the 65 businesses, 27 are small businesses and vendors are from Madera and Fresno County, totaling \$97.2 million in commitments to those companies.

One of those companies, Valley Coffee based in Fresno, is supplying water bottles, coffee brewers and materials to the Authority's design-build con-

tractor, Tutor Perini/Zachry/Parsons, at their offices in downtown Fresno. This contract not only represents the Authority's commitment to hiring locally, it also provides owner Mike LaRue with an opportunity to work with the government for the first time, which will open a whole new potential list of future jobs and clients.

Cumulative small business participation to date includes 219 certified small businesses committed to working on the program, with 67 of those businesses certified as DBE and 32 certified as DVBE. Since July 2014, small business utilization on the project stands at 27 percent, with \$29 million paid out to small businesses for their work on the program.

The Authority has an aggressive 30 percent goal for small business participation, with 10 percent to DBE and 3 percent to DVBE. This report shows that many of the Authority's prime contractors are meeting and exceeding this goal. ### About California High-Speed Rail Authority

The California High-Speed Rail Authority (Authority) is responsible for planning, designing, building and operation of the first high-speed rail system in the nation. California high-speed rail will connect the mega-regions of the state, contribute to economic development and a cleaner environment, create jobs and preserve agricultural and protected lands. By 2029, the system will run from San Francisco to the Los Angeles basin in under three hours at speeds capable of over 200 miles per hour. The system will eventually extend to Sacramento and San Diego, totaling 800 miles with up to 24 stations. In addition, the Authority is working with regional partners to implement a statewide rail modernization plan that will invest billions of dollars in local and regional rail lines to meet the state's 21st century transportation needs. ## Community Collaboratives Show Persistence and Progress

Over the past eight years, Milwaukee's multisector collaborative working to cut the city's alarming teen pregnancy rate has delivered a lot of educational messages, none more memorable than the "pregnant boys" campaign. The late 2000s campaign—emblazoned on bus shelters and billboards, and in other public places—featured photos of shirtless teenage boys with baby bumps and the tag line, "It shouldn't be any less disturbing when it's a girl."

The city's residents paid attention. In 2006, Milwaukee had the second-highest teen birth rate in the nation. By 2013, that rate dropped by 56 percent—surpassing the collaborative's ambitious, original goal of a 46 percent drop. While teen pregnancy rates have been falling across the country, Milwaukee's has come down far faster.

Though it got underway well before John Kania and Mark Kramer coined the term collective impact, Milwaukee's fight against teen pregnancy is a classic collective-impact initiative, albeit one with a narrower goal than some. It brings together stakeholders from a range of sectors—education, public health, business, and media—to focus on an ambitious, shared goal, using data to measure

its progress and led by a "backbone" organization, the United Way.

A 2012 report on community collaboratives by the Bridgespan Group and the White House Council for Community Solutions, featured this initiative as one of 12 that produced measureable improvement of at least 10 percent on a challenging community issue such as teen pregnancy, youth violence, and poor educational achievement.

Recently, we went back to these communities to see if there were any patterns of persistence or progress, and write a follow-up report. We found that, with one exception, all of these communities continue to collaborate and that most continue to improve outcomes. However, these "needle-movers" have faced a set of common challenges, forcing them to learn and evolve in different ways. These include:

- Getting and keeping stakeholders at the table.
- Managing changes in the external environment.
- Getting community buy-in.
- Using data to improve and communicate results.

## San Francisco Board Rejects Luxury Housing Moratorium

Check out rental sites for San Francisco, especially the trendier parts: Well over \$3,000 a month for a one-bedroom flat and nearly \$5,000 for two bedrooms.

Finding a place to live in the city has become so expensive and emotional that city supervisors considered a 45-day moratorium on luxury housing construction in the Mission District, traditionally one of the most diverse, working-class neighborhoods in San Francisco.

But the plan failed on a vote that came at the end of a marathon session shortly before midnight Tuesday.

The Supervisors voted 7-4 in favor of the moratorium, but the San Francisco Chronicle reported that the measure required nine votes to pass as an "interim emergency ordinance."

The paper said disappointed supporters vowed to put the proposed moratorium on the November ballot.

The area in question — long home to modest taquerias and corner markets — is now teeming with Silicon Valley workers and the pricey restaurants that cater to them.

Fancy high-rises are planned to take over dilapidated street corners, including one development that tenant activists have dubbed the "Monster in

the Mission," a building with more than 300 units and rents projected to start at \$3,500.

The growth is pushing out longtime tenants, said hundreds of people who crowded San Francisco City Hall last month to support the moratorium and urge a time-out on evictions.

They say that working families, especially Latinos, are being forced out by housing developers and that city officials have a responsibility to fight back. "It's a working class environment. I have family here, and at the rate it's going, we're not going to have anyone we know close by," Hugo Vargas said.

The 16-year-old Vargas shares a small room with his parents and two younger sisters. Their space in a single-room occupancy hotel goes for about \$900 a month, and his parents, who earn about \$45,000 combined, have applied unsuccessfully for years for a rent-controlled apartment that would give them more space.

A moratorium would have given the city time to buy some of the land available in the Mission District in order to develop hundreds of affordable housing units for lower-income and middle-income families, activists said before the vote. Otherwise, they fear developers will snap up the

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# Trumark Urban Breaks Ground on Two San Francisco Projects in One Day

Trumark Urban has been busy lately. On May 22 the developer broke ground on two different mixed-use projects in its hometown city of San Francisco. In the morning, the company cut the ribbon on Rowan in the city's burgeoning Inner Mission district, and in the afternoon, it launched construction on Knox, in the Dogpatch neighborhood. Together, both projects are valued at more than \$100 million.

Featuring an external, cast-in-place concrete structure designed by the San Francisco office of Handel Architects, the seven-story Rowan will offer 70 residents in one-, two-, and three-bedroom units. The 71,000-sq-ft mixed-use condominium development will be highlighted by vibrant communal spaces, and an impressive 3,200 sq-ft roof terrace with gas barbecues, vertical gardens, and stunning views of the San Francisco skyline. The project is scheduled to complete in fall of 2016 and be GreenPoint Rated, while boasting one dedicated City CarShare space and electric vehicle charging stations.

After breaking ground at Rowan, Trumark and project officials headed over to Knox, a 91-unit mixed-use project in the vibrant and eccentric Dogpatch neighborhood. Knox will feature 91 units in a variety of sizes, including several family-friendly three-bedroom units, along with intimate communal spaces and locally-sourced artwork, including a water feature created from a reclaimed bridge.

Designed by San Francisco-based BDE Architects, with the interior design by SCB Architects of San Francisco, the roughly 135,000 sq-ft Knox

will be GreenPoint Rated, and feature an electric vehicle charging station, a sustainably landscaped courtyard with a butterfly habitat; two dedicated City CarShare spaces, and a green roof. The project is slated to complete in spring 2016.

Rowan and Knox are the latest projects in Trumark's California portfolio. In March of this year, the firm broke ground on TEN50, a 151-unit luxury high-rise condominium tower in downtown Los Angeles, and in San Francisco, construction continues on The Pacific, the high-profile former dental school located in Pacific Heights that boasts sweeping Golden Gate Bridge views. Amero, a boutique residential property in the city's Cow Hollow neighborhood, was completed in 2014. Through the company's various developments, Trumark Urban will create over 2,500 new jobs nationally, say company officials.

"In the next three years Trumark Urban will add over 1000 condos throughout San Francisco and Los Angeles," said Trumark managing director Arden Hearing, in a recent press release. "We have worked closely with city and community leaders, neighborhood stakeholders and local residents to ensure that we are true partners and create developments that respect and enhance the unique neighborhoods that our projects call home."

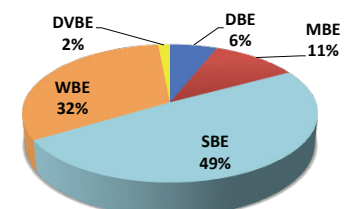

## San Francisco Board Rejects Luxury Housing Moratorium

property for even more high-priced units.

The district has lost lower-income and middle-income households, according to a recent study by the nonprofit Council of Community Housing Organizations.

Families earning \$50,000 to \$75,000 made up a quarter of Mission households in 2000; today that number is 13 percent. Households with incomes of at least \$100,000, meanwhile, have increased.

"It's trending into something that's not a working-class neighborhood," says Gabriel Medina, president of the San Francisco Latino Democratic Club.

The vote by the city's Board of Supervisors on the moratorium showed how officials are desperate to do something about housing in a city where the prices are among the nation's highest.

Dozens of moratorium opponents gathered at a City Hall rally early Tuesday afternoon. Organizer Derek Remski said officials should focus on growth, rather than attempts to artificially cap prices.

"We can't freeze the city in a block of amber," he says. "I don't want to fossilize San Francisco."

Three hours into the hearing, dozens were still waiting for their chance to speak. Most of those who took the podium were overwhelmingly in support of preserving lots in a city they called a safe haven for immigrants and the poor, the working class and artists.

"I hope, I pray, I yearn that San Francisco really becomes the city of St Francis," said the Rev. Amos Brown of the Third Baptist Church.

According to the city, more than two dozen projects would have been affected by the ordinance, including the "Monster," formally named for its address, 1979 Mission.

Most of the development's units would be for rent, with a few dozen priced for sale to households earning roughly \$60,000 to \$145,000 a year, according to spokesman Joe Arellano.

A moratorium wouldn't solve anything, Arellano said.

"If you limit the supply of new housing, demand is still high. And rent and home prices will continue to go through the roof," he said.

## Why CDFIs Stand Out from the Pack

In 2013, 242 bank-related mergers and acquisitions took place in the U.S. As it becomes routine for one bank to replace another on Main Street, consumers may find it harder to make connections with their bankers and increasingly see their banks as separate from their greater lives. Consumers may even think that one bank is about the same as the next.

But the truth is that not all banks are alike. A new study by the National Community Investment Fund profiles 24 financial institutions representing the greater "mission-oriented" banking

industry. The surveyed institutions include 21 certified community development financial institutions and 16 designated as minority depository institution banks.

From Carver FSB in New York to The Harbor Bank of Maryland in Baltimore to Community Bank of the Bay in Oakland, these banks stand apart from the broader universe of 6,500 banks in the United States.

Mission-oriented banks are on the ground in America's most disadvantaged communities with above-average poverty levels. When these banks make loans, create jobs and extend their banking services, they transform the lives of underserved citizens and neighborhoods that may have never seen the branch of a larger bank. Mission-oriented banks also steer consumers and businesses away from alternative financial service providers such as payday lenders, which may be irresponsible and usurious. Many, including Beneficial State Bank in Oakland, are also focused on promoting environmentally sustainable businesses.

Just how different are mission-oriented banks from the rest? Consider these facts:

- The median bank profiled in our survey directed 69% of mortgage loans reported under the Home Mortgage Disclosure Act to low- and moderate-income areas. By contrast, the median bank amongst all U.S. institutions directed 26% to low- and moderate-income communities. Focusing tightly on the needs of such individuals provides impact investors with a clearer way to direct their dollars where they can do the most good.

- The median bank profiled in our survey had 86% of its branches in low- and moderate-income areas, compared to 40% for all U.S. banks.

- The median poverty rate for the surveyed banks' branch locations is 1.8 times higher than for U.S. banks overall, and the unemployment rate is 1.6 times higher. Branches are located in areas with poverty rates as high as 71% and unemployment rates as high as 23%.

The differences between mission-oriented banks and other banks do not stop there. Bank staff work extended periods of time with customers, providing one-on-one counseling and technical assistance, so that their customers can gain access to the traditional mortgage market or a Small Business Administration loan.

Moreover, the customers in these banks and the people who assist them are as diverse as their surrounding communities:

- More than 44% of deposit accounts held less than \$1,000, likely reflecting a preponderance of low-income clients whose lower-balance accounts are expensive for the banks to administer. Managing these needs comes naturally to the mission-oriented staff at these banks.
- Eight-one percent of clients are minorities and 43% are women.
- Eighty-six percent of bank employees are minorities and 68% are women, while 64% of bank board members are minorities and 20% are women. This enables them to bring cultural and local input into their business plans and product strategies.

While mission-oriented financial institutions are similar in size to the median bank in the U.S., they create additional social and environmental impact. For example, loans made by these banks and credit unions created as many as 70,000 jobs since 1998, according to the our newest report. Based on data contributed by banks participating in the report, approximately 10,600 jobs were created in 2013, of which an estimated 45% went to women and 65% to minorities.

Individuals and institutions engaged in impact investing need look no further than their closest mission-oriented bank to find a place where they can make a real and needed difference. The work these local institutions do creates long-term change for individuals and businesses.

Mission-oriented banks are vital to community well-being on their own, but they also play a critical role that complements the work of other national, state-chartered and specialized banks in the overall sector. They also frequently partner with larger banks to help them tailor their business models to the realities of communities with high poverty rates and low employment levels.

Public- and private-sector investors should actively support mission-oriented banks. These banks make underserved communities better places to live and work, contributing to the long-term benefit of society.

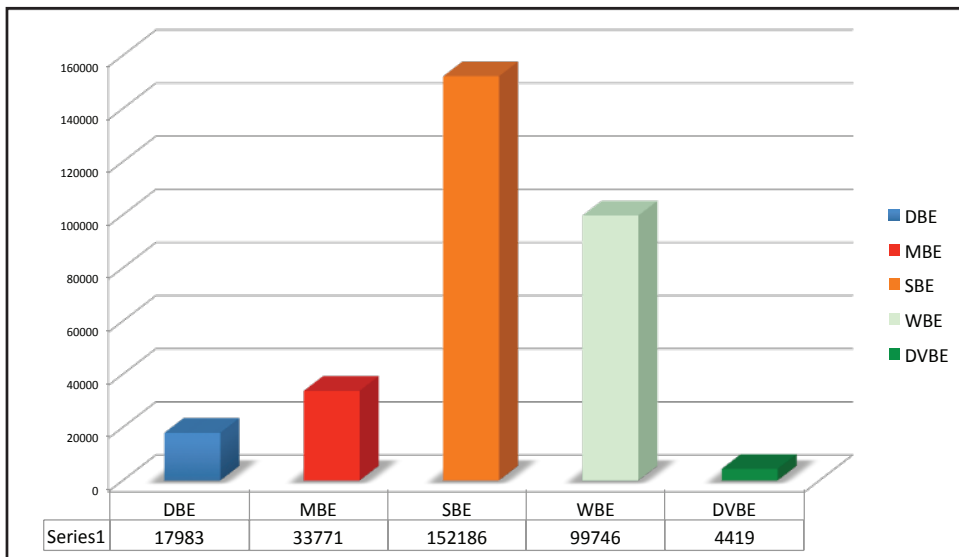

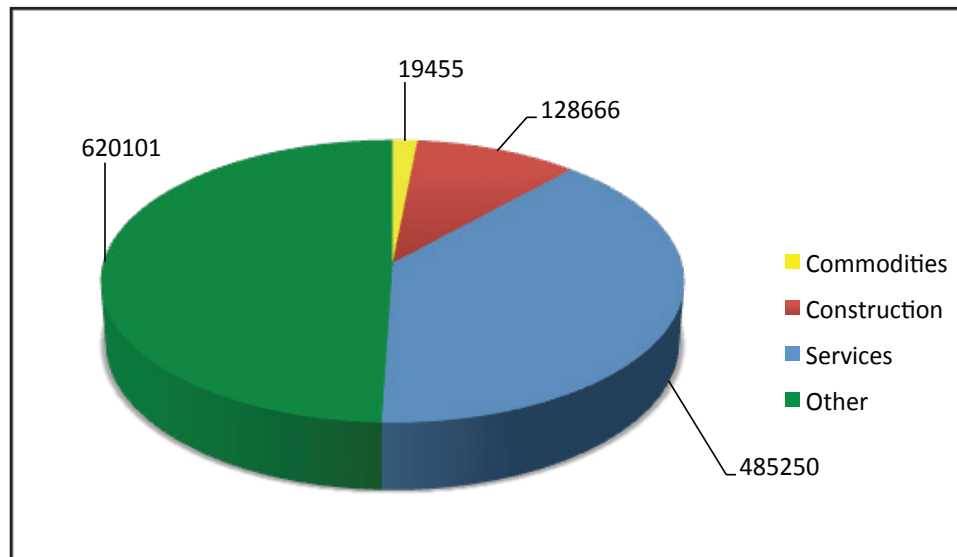
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### California Demographics by Ownership
