Northrop Grumman Corp. - Aerospace Systems, El Segundo, California, has been awarded a \$16,969,350 modification (P00287) for radar software corrections under previously awarded contract F19628-00-C-0100. The contract modification is for Multi-Platform Radar Technology Insertion Program radar system development and demonstration alignment with the Global Hawk Block 40 program schedule. Work will be performed at El Segundo, California, and is expected to be completed on Nov. 30, 2016. Fiscal 2015 research, development, test and evaluation funds in the amount of \$200,000 are being obligated at time of award. Working Group on African American **Inclusion and Diversity in Travel and Hospitality Industry**

Editor's Note:

This is the second in a series of articles that began last week on "San Francisco - Two Tales of One City".

Introduction

Background and History

In the fall of 2013, in response to community concerns about diversity in tourism in San Francisco, an unprecedented group of leaders representing industry, civil rights, business, government, and education began working together to ensure the accurate and prominent portrayal, both domestically and internationally, of the African American community as an integral member of City's richly diverse family. Following outreach, conversation and collaboration, these leaders expanded their mission to also examine the multiple ways in which diversity, equity, and economic inclusion could be advanced throughout the hospitality and travel industries in San Francisco, including in contracting, small business, workforce development, and employment.

Working Group Objectives

While the initial focus began with a concern about equity and inclusion specifically for African Americans in San Francisco, the overriding objectives of this collaboration were to (1) identify tools and (2) implement tangible solutions that result in the full and fair inclusion of all underrepresented communities in all aspects of the City's robust travel and hospitality industries. Particular attention was paid to the City's most disadvantaged and underrepresented communities, workers, census tracts, businesses and neighborhoods.

On January 15, 2014, a working group comprised of more than 60 leaders representing San Francisco community and faith-based organizations, African American civil rights and business organizations, Departments of the City & County of San Francisco, labor, higher education, and the travel and hospitality industry convened to establish a forum and process for their collective work. The working members aimed to identify proactive

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


steps that members of the working group could jointly pursue to enhance and support African American participation in San Francisco's travel and hospitality industry, including the establishment of effective industry partnerships aimed at enabling the full inclusion of African Americans in San Francisco's tourism industry. The working groups were focused, in part, on advancing the inclusion and vitality of African American businesses and the African American community as a whole in the hospitality and tourist economies.

Toward this end, the working group agreed to subdivide into five (5) sub-committees charged with identifying recommendations that can be pursued to fulfill the purpose of the Working Group, culminating in a final report of their work to the full working group by April 30, 2014.

These subcommittees included the following:

- Tourism Diversity and Inclusion
- Hospitality Workforce Development and Employment
- Business Development and Technical Assistance
- Construction Contracting and Procurement



This Report is a compilation of the diligent work of the subcommittees and will be used by the full working group to pursue priority actions in partnership with the community as a whole. The working group will appoint an Executive Steering Committee to continue the leadership, progress, and monitoring of the recommendations and im-plementation actions reflected herein.

A Shared Commitment to Equity and Inclusion

We realize that there may be differing views, even across our subcommittees, regarding our specific suggestions, but we hope that all who read this report will share our commitment and determination to advance the inclusion of African Americans in the hospitality industries, as workers, contractors, business owners and tourists. That shared commitment should be the foundation of a common plan to celebrate San Francisco's rich diversity and history, and open up the hospitality and travel industry to all. Our recommendations, therefore, aim to speak to what all stakeholders

Chase Awards Three Northern California Small Businesses \$300,000 in Grants Through Its Mission Main Street Grants Program



Three Northern California small businesses were awarded \$300,000 in grants recently through Chase's Mission Main Street Grants, a program to support U.S. small businesses.

The companies – Bay Area Medical Academy, GreenLynx and Real Good Fish – were among 20 small firms chosen nationwide out of an applicant pool of more than 30,000 businesses from all 50 states.

Dream Come True

For GreenLynx, a deconstruction company that offers materials reuse and green consulting for residential and commercial properties throughout Sonoma and San Francisco Counties, the grant is a dream come true.

"With the Chase Mission Main Street Grant, we can now make our dream of creating a reclaimed lumber processing division a reality," said Nicole Tai, founder and president of GreenLynx. "We're passionate about our mission to reduce the construction industry's collective carbon footprint by capturing large quantities of a virtually untapped reclaimed lumber market and bringing historic and beautiful wood back into the cycle of production."

Bay Area Medical Academy, a career-training program based in San Francisco which offers licensing and certifications in the growing health care field for jobs such as medical assistant, pharmacy technician, phlebotomist and EKG technician, will use the grant to expand.

"Bay Area Medical Academy is transforming the way technical skills education is done in the US," said Simonida Cvejic, BAMA's founder and chief executive. "We are a community-based school that strives to provide quality healthcare education that is debt-free. And we have done really well, creating recruitment pipelines for employers that feed into jobs. This grant is going to help us expand our unique workforce training programs, add classroom space in San Francisco and San Jose, hire more staff, and ultimately train more students and help them get jobs. We work to produce skilled workers who are crucial to our country's thriving economy, while guiding people towards self-sufficiency."

Real Good Fish, under the parent company of Local Bounty, provides local, sustainable seafood each week to its members. The Monterey-based company's latest endeavor, Bay2Tray, provides local fish for public school lunches. Alan Lovewell, the owner of Real Good Fish, is excited about the investment. "By investing in our local fishing, we





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Access to Capital in Indian Country

[Written Testimony of Alejandra Y. Castillo, National Director Minority Business Development Agency U.S. Department of Commerce Before the United States Senate Committee on Indian Affairs "Accessing Capital in Indian Country".]

Good Afternoon Chairman Barrasso, Vice Chairman Tester, and members of the Committee. I am Alejandra Castillo, and I serve as the National Director of the Minority Business Development Agency, also known as MBDA, at the U.S. Department of Commerce. I am pleased to be here today to discuss the topic of "Accessing Capital in Indian Country."

There are many programs within the Department that benefit tribes, including programs that offer grants to tribal governments for the purpose of economic and infrastructure development, programs that help tribal businesses export their goods overseas, and tourism projects that help attract more revenue to tribal lands. We are here today to discuss access to capital, but accessing capital is one prong of the business development strategy. The Department has many programs which can help Native-owned businesses thrive.

My testimony today will outline MBDA's mission and vision in assisting the Nation's 5.8 million minority-owned businesses, which also include businesses owned by American Indians and Alaska Natives. For the purpose of this hearing, I will highlight MBDA's research findings on access to capital and steps MBDA is taking to create a more robust and sustainable ecosystem to help minority businesses obtain more capital for their current and future needs. Finally, I would like to share some specific examples of American Indian and Alaska Native firms that have grown as a result of working with MBDA.

The Minority Business Development Agency: Overview

For over forty-five years, MBDA has been working aggressively to expand the economic footprint of minority business enterprises (MBEs). MBDA serves as the only federal agency tasked to help MBEs realize their full economic potential through technical assistance, public and private contracting opportunities, advocacy, research, education, and by serving as a strategic partner for growth and development. The bulk of this work is accomplished through our nationwide network of MBDA Business Centers. Each Center provides services that assist businesses in accessing capital, contracts, and new markets, as well as helping them to grow in size and scale.

Research Findings: Disparities in Access to Capital

In 2010, MBDA released a report entitled, "Disparities in Capital Access." Some of the key findings included:

- Minority-owned firms receive lower loan amounts than non-minority firms. While the average loan amount for all high-sales minority firms was \$149,000, non-minority firms received an average of \$310,000 or more than twice the amount;
- Minority-owned firms are more likely to be denied loans. Among firms with gross receipts under \$500,000, loan denial rates for minority firms were about three times higher compared to those of non-minority-owned firms. For high sales firms, the rate of loan denial was almost twice as high for minority firms as for non-minority firms; and
- Minority-owned firms receive lower loan and equity investment amounts. Minority firms averaged \$29,879 in external debt compared with \$36,777 for non-minority firms. Minority firms had the most trouble obtaining external equity with \$2,984 on average compared with \$7,607 on average for non-minority firms.

Native business owners, especially tribal governments and Native entrepreneurs living in Indian Country, face many obstacles when trying to access capital. By any socioeconomic indicator, American Indians, Alaska Natives, and Native Hawaiians are the most underserved population in the country. to lending institutions on or near Native lands may be lower than in other areas of the country. Many Indian reservations lack sufficient infrastructure such as adequate sewers, water, roads, and broadband. Many tribes are geographically isolated and therefore struggle to attract skilled workforces, teachers, and health professionals – which in turn, makes it more difficult for businesses to thrive on Indian lands. But despite these grim statistics, many tribes have succeeded in creating thriving economies and many Native peoples have successfully launched businesses. All things being equal, access to capital is really a relationship business and that's where MBDA shines.

Minority Business Development Agency: Working with Native Communities

MBDA has a long history of partnering with our tribal and Native American colleagues, such as the National Center for American Indian Enterprise Development, the American Indian Chamber of Commerce of New Mexico, the United Tribes Technical College, and the Indian Pueblo Cultural Center. We embrace the rich culture of Native American tribes and we understand that while native-owned businesses might be classified as MBEs, the United States owes a unique trust responsibility to the various Indian tribes and Native Americans. We believe that the best way for tribes to effectively self-govern is to empower tribes and Native peoples to create jobs and opportunities onand off-reservation. That is why six MBDA Business Centers are located in geographical areas with large American Indian and Alaska Native populations: Anchorage, Alaska; Fresno, California; Santa Fe, New Mexico; Bismarck, North Dakota, Tulsa, Oklahoma; and Bridgeport, Connecticut.

When a Native-owned firm comes to MBDA seeking assistance with access to capital, our Business Centers provide individually tailored consulting services to them. These services include helping them identify their immediate and long-term business needs; establishing projected growth tracks; implementing targeted plans of action for increasing the firm's size, scale, and capacity; and providing strategic support to promote the achievement of the firm's desired outcomes.



Hewlett Packard PUSHes forward with Minority Participation in Financial Services



Last week, Hewlett Packard launched a \$15 Billion debt offering, the sixth largest bond offering of the year. Most significantly, five minority firms participated in the debt offering:

Blaylock Beal; MFR Securities; Loop Capital; Ramirez and Co., and Williams Capital.

Rev. Jesse Jackson said, "These firms were founded decades ago by minority entrepreneurs. Their success was built with sharp minds, hard work which earned them strategic key relationships with institutions."

Rainbow PUSH Coalition's PUSHTech2020 initiative has fueled minority participation in corporate debt offerings of tech companies. Following Rev. Jackson's appearance t the HP shareholder meeting in March of 2014, PUSH-Tech2020 convened several networking events with minority firms and HP, and opened up new avenues of access and opportunity.

Rev. Jackson, "HP leaders were responded positively and pro-actively. They took the time to meet with and learn the value that minority firms could bring to the marketplace, and HP built a win-win formula. They embraced the premise that "there is no talent deficit, there's an opportunity deficit. They are to be commended." Why is minority participation in HP's debt offering so significant? Rainbow PUSH's research of 45 debt offerings issued by tech firms (Ebay, HP, Oracle, Apple, Google) from 2010-13, minority firms were included in just five. HP had conducted twenty offerings during this period. To its credit, Microsoft included minority firms in all 14 of its debt offerings!)

Since the PUSHTech2020 latest "push" begun 18 months ago, the tide is turning:

- Apple has included minority-owned firms in its two debt offerings conducted this year;
- * Microsoft had four minority firms in its February \$11 Billion debt offering;
- * Qualcomm included three minority firms in their \$10M debt offering in May;
- * Intel followed suit by involving minority firms in its \$7Billion offering in July.
- * Etsy included minority owned investment banks in its recent IPO.

In prior years, minority investment banking firms participated in the IPO's of both Google and Facebook, and sights are set on ensuring minority inclusion in the projected IPO's of Square, Uber, and other "unicorns" that are on the horizon.

As HP splits into two new companies in November, HP's also recently announced the appointment of two African Americans to each (four total) of the two new companies (HP-E and Hewlett Packard). HP is taking concrete, measurable action to make diversity and inclusion bedrock of the company.



That's good news, and just last week, Apple appointed an African American, James Bell, to its Board of Directors.

Prior to 2014, Rainbow PUSH research showed that there were just 3 African Americans out of 189 total Board members of 20 tech companies. Since its PUSH, eight (8) African Americans now sit on tech boards. That's real progress and change."

Rev. Jackson: "Diversity and inclusion is not limited to the workforce. There is also an access to capital, "business dimension"- supplier diversity and procurement opportunities, access to capital for minority start-ups and companies, and inclusion of minority financial services firms in debt offerings, IPO's and other transactions.

PUSHTech2020 is changing the flow of the river. We hope that other Silicon Valley technology companies will follow open up new business opportunities for minority firms. It's good business; when there is inclusion, there is growth and when there is growth, everybody wins."

Executive Summarv

The five working group subcommittees each convened a series of separate meetings to identify and review issues related to their respective subject matter and develop recommended actions that can be pursued to facilitate the full inclusion of African Americans in San Francisco's travel and hospitality industry. Below is a brief executive summary of the recommendations developed. The full reports of each subcommittee, including topics examined, full recommendations, and implementation activities, are included in the remainder of this report.

Tourism Diversity and Inclusion

- Marketing and Promotions. Strengthening the African American community through culturally competent, neighborhood-specific marketing activities, including industry networking events, regular domestic and international promotional materials, community-based organizational partnerships, and board engagement by San Francisco Travel.

 Commencement of a stakeholder process to evaluate Fillmore/Western Addition as a Community Benefit District.

- Data and Reporting. Working with various hotels, City government, local unions, local commerce chambers, and the Moscone Center, assembling and disseminating Hospitality Inclusion Reports providing demographic data on the availability and utilization of African Americans, and other underserved San Franciscans, as hospitality trainees, applicants, and workers.

Additionally, MBDA advocates for MBEs, including Nativeowned firms, in the traditional banking space through relationships with national level banks and countless community banks through MBDA's national Business Center network. We also work closely with another federal agency outside the Department of Commerce, the Small Business Administration, on increasing opportunities for MBEs to pursue micro-lending opportunities. Through these partnerships and our steadfast commitment to the American Indian and Alaska Native community, MBDA has served thousands of Native American businesses. This year, to date, our entire network of centers has worked with nearly 1,100 American Indian and Alaska Native firms. Further, over the past six fiscal years, FY 2009-FY 2014, MBDA has assisted American Indian and Alaska Native clients with accessing nearly \$1.87 billion in capital.

New Strategies to Improve Access to Capital for Minorityowned Businesses

In addition to providing access to traditional sources for capital, MBDA is pursuing alternative sources of capital for minorityowned firms. We created a new Access to Capital Team whose work has been two-fold: to educate clients and firms about the types of alternative financing available, and to advocate on their behalf with the kind of resource partners that minority-owned firms have a difficult time accessing. Minority firms lack adequate access to venture capitalists, angel investors, mergers and acquisitions firms, firms with internet-based platforms, and the many other firms that act as ever more important alternative sources of capital. As I mentioned earlier in my testimony, access to financial institutions by Native-owned businesses, particularly those in rural areas, is exacerbated by geography.

While putting experienced staff to work on the issue is important, it would be nothing without top-level engagement. That is why last October I spoke at the Minority Finance Forum, hosted in partnership with the Association for Corporate Growth in Chicago. I addressed over 800 investment bankers, private equity groups, bank fund managers, family offices, merger and acquisi-tion companies, and banks. While there, I highlighted the need for minority-owned firms to play a role in the middle market and break the barrier in accessing capital. This message was well-received by the attendees. MBDA will continue to engage firms like these to help expand access for minority-owned firms.

Since we understand that many Native business owners might not attend minority business conferences in favor of those focused on Native enterprises, MBDA and other bureaus within the De-

partment have been actively engaging Native business stakeholders. This past March, for instance, I spoke at the 29th Annual Reservation Economic Summit (RES), the leading American Indian enterprise development summit where Native American businesses gather with CEO's, policy makers, and elected leaders to shape the future of economic development in Indian Country. MBDA has also assisted The National Center with coordinating an "access to capital" workshop for the RES conference held this past March in Las Vegas. Additionally, the Department of Commerce, through the Secretary's Office, the Census Bureau, and SelectUSA, a program within the International Trade Administration, has contributed to this week's RES-DC Conference to make it a success.

Finally, MBDA is also engaged in the use of alternative finance through partnerships with a large portfolio of alternative capital providers including internet based lenders, angel investor networks, micro lenders, Community Development Financial Institutions, and other investors in the middle-market space. Through our Business Center Network, these resources are available to MBEs including Native-owned firms.

MBDA Native American Client Success Stories

MBDA has been successful in assisting Native-owned businesses access capital. I would like to highlight two examples of our work.

Given Oklahoma's high Native American population, it is no surprise that 85 percent of the Tulsa MBDA Business Center cli-ents are Native American, including tribally-owned and individual Native-owned firms. One such client is Cherokee CRC, an award winning environmental, construction, and professional services company with Tribal 8(a) and HUBZone certifications. In Fiscal year 2014, the Tulsa MBDA Business Center helped the firm se-cure \$68 million in contracts and \$15 million in financing. The company is tribally-owned so all profits from these endeavors are returned to the Cherokee Nation.

The tribe is currently constructing four new health clinics and a hospital with profits from Cherokee CRC and other triballyowned businesses

About Venture Capital

Venture capital is a type of equity financing that addresses the funding needs of entrepreneurial companies that for reasons of size, assets, and stage of development cannot seek capital from more traditional sources, such as public markets and banks. Venture capital investments are generally made as cash in exchange for shares and an active role in the invested company.

Venture capital differs from traditional financing sources in that venture capital typically:

- Focuses on young, high-growth companies
- Invests equity capital, rather than debt
- Takes higher risks in exchange for potential higher returns
- Has a longer investment horizon than traditional financing
- Actively monitors portfolio companies via board participation, strategic marketing, governance, and capital structure

Successful long-term growth for most businesses is dependent upon the availability of equity capital. Lenders generally require some equity cushion or security (collateral) before they will lend to a small business. A lack of equity limits the debt financing available to businesses. Additionally, debt financing requires the ability to service the debt through current interest payments. These funds are then not available to grow the business.

Venture capital provides businesses a financial cushion. However, equity providers have the last call against the company's assets. In view of this lower priority and the usual lack of a current pay requirement, equity providers require a higher rate of return/return on investment (ROI) than lenders receive.

Understanding Venture Capital

Venture capital for new and emerging businesses typically comes from high net worth individuals ("angel investors") and venture capital firms. These investors usually provide capital unsecured by assets to young, private companies with the potential for rapid growth. This type of investing inherently carries a high degree of risk. But venture capital is long-term or "patient capital" that allows companies the time to mature into profitable organizations.

Venture capital is also an active rather than passive form of financing. These investors seek to add value, in addition to capital, to the companies in which they invest in an effort to help them grow and achieve a greater return on the investment. This requires active involvement; almost all venture capitalists will, at a minimum, want a seat on the board of directors.

Although investors are committed to a company for the long haul, that does not mean indefinitely. The primary objective of equity investors is to achieve a superior rate of return through the eventual and timely disposal of investments. A good investor will be considering potential exit strategies from the time the investment is first presented and investigated.

Angel Investors

Business "angels" are high net worth individual investors who seek high returns through private investments in start-up companies. Private investors generally are a diverse and dispersed population who made their wealth through a variety of sources. But the typical business angels are often former entrepreneurs or executives who cashed out and retired early from ventures that they started and grew into successful businesses.

These self-made investors share many common characteristics:

- They seek companies with high growth potentials, strong management teams, and solid business plans to aid the angels in assessing the company's value. (Many seed or start ups may not have a fully developed management team, but have identified key positions.)
- They typically invest in ventures involved in industries or technologies with which they are personally familiar.
- They often co-invest with trusted friends and business associates. In these situations, there is usually one influential lead investor ("archangel") those judgment is trusted by the rest of the group of angels.
- Because of their business experience, many angels invest more than their money. They also seek active involvement in the business, such as consulting and mentoring the entrepreneur. They often take bigger risks or accept lower rewards when they are attracted to the non-financial characteristics of an entrepreneur's proposal.

Understanding Equity Capital

Equity capital or financing is money raised by a business in exchange for a share of ownership in the company. Ownership is represented by owning shares of stock outright or having the right to convert other financial instruments into stock of that private company. FEE WAIVER: If you cannot pay the filing fee, ask the clerk for a fee waiver form. The court may order you to pay back all or part of the fees and costs that the court waived for you or the other party.

Starting immediately, you and your spouse or domestic partner are restrained from:

1. removing the minor children of the parties from the state or applying for a new or replacement passport for those minor chil-dren without the prior written consent of the other party or an order of the court;

2. cashing, borrowing against, canceling, transferring, disposing of, or changing the beneficiaries of any insurance or other cover age, including life, health, automobile, and disability, held for the benefit of the parties and their minor children;

3. transferring, encumbering, hypothecating, concealing, or in any way disposing of any property, real or personal, whether community, quasi-community, or separate, without the written consent of the other party or an order of the court, except in the usual course of business or for the necessities of life; and

4. creating a nonprobate transfer or modifying a nonprobate subject to the transfer in a manner that affects the disposition of property subject to the transfer, without the written consent of the other party or an order of the court. Before revocation of a nonprobate transfer can take effect or a right of survivorship to property can be eliminated, notice of the

change must be filed and served on the other party.

You must notify each other of any proposed extraordinary expen-ditures at least five business days prior to incurring these extraor-dinary expenditures and account to the court for all extraordinary expenditures made after these restraining orders are effective However, you may use community property, quasi-community property, or your own separate property to pay an attorney to help you or to pay court costs
