Obama Budget Features Proposed \$478-Billion Transport Bill



President Obama is proposing legislation that would spend \$478 billion over the next six years to boost the nation's infrastructure.

President Obama's nearly \$4-trillion budget proposal for fiscal year 2016 has a picture of a bridge on its cover, reflecting one of the main elements inside the book: substantial spending on infrastructure, especially the initial year's \$478-billion, six-year surface-transportation bill.

Along with the ambitious transportation proposal, the budget request, sent to Congress on Feb. contains a mix of recommended boosts and cutbacks in other major construction accounts.

Leading Republicans, who now control both houses of Congress, blasted the overall Obama budget and said they would develop their own spending blueprint, with different priorities.

One point that has drawn bipartisan support is the need for a multi-year surface-transportation bill, preferably before a current short extension lapses on May 31.

The Obama administration rolled out a \$302-billion, four-year transportation proposal in February 2014, but it gained no traction on Capitol Hill.

This time, the White House has put an even larger infrastructure plan on the table. Of the envisioned \$478-billion, six-year total, the Federal Highway Administration would get \$317 billion and Federal Transit Administration would receive \$114.6 billion.

According to Dept. of Transportation figures, the biggest gains by far would come in the plan's first year. Surface-transportation programs would soar by 40%, to \$55.2 billion, in 2016, then rise modestly in each of the next five years, reaching \$82.3 billion in 2021.

Looking at key line items, FHWA's 2016 highway obligation ceiling would vault 24%, to \$50.1 billion, and FTA's spending would climb 68%, to \$18.2 billion—both record amounts.

The plan also proposes a federal infrastructure bank; new taxable America Fast Forward Bonds, similar to the now-expired Build America Bonds, and tax-exempt Qualified Public Infrastructure Bonds, aimed at public-private ventures.

The administration has floated all those proposals before, with the idea for public infrastructure bonds unveiled about two weeks ago.

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Secretary Foxx Unveils "Beyond Traffic: Trends and Choices"



MOUNTAIN VIEW, CA - U.S. Transportation Secretary Anthony Foxx was joined today by Google Chairman Eric Schmidt to unveil Beyond Traffic, a new forward-looking analysis from the U.S. Department of Transportation outlining the trends that are likely to shape the needs of our transportation system over the next three decades. Beyond Traffic is offered to the public as a draft to ignite a national conversation about the future of the U.S. transportation system and to objectively

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frame critical policy choices that need to be made. A final report will be released later in 2015 based on the ideas and public feedback generated by this analysis.

"For too long, our national dialogue about transportation has been focused on recreating the past. Instead, we need to focus on the trends that are shaping our future," said Secretary Foxx. "In Washington, in state capitals and in city halls, it is time to sound the alarm bell: the future is calling. Beyond Traffic gives us a view into 2045 and the basis to plan for it. But not having a plan is a plan."

The critical questions and major trends and choices identified include:

How will we move? America's population will grow by 70 million by 2045. How will we build a transportation system to accommodate a growing population and changing travel patterns?

How will we move things? By 2045, freight volume will increase 45 percent. How will we reduce

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Hispanics Less Likely to Leave their Financial Future up to Chance

Hispanics take fewer risks in planning for retirement, education, and emergency security

A new survey from Massachusetts Mutual Life Insurance Company (MassMutual) found that compared to the rest of the population, Hispanics are working harder to secure their financial futures. In every way measured in this research, Hispanics are more invested in their own financial future than the general population. The study found that 65 percent of the general population reported that they leave their financial well-being up to chance. U.S. Hispanics, however, leave less to chance (61 percent). The research seeks to shed light on how prepared U.S. Hispanics are for their financial future vs. all Americans, and how likely they are to "take a chance" with planning for their retirement, education, and emergency security.

"This newest research is in line with our ongoing State of the American Family Study; it shows that Hispanics are invested in their future," said Chris Mendoza, Vice President, Multicultural Market Development at MassMutual. "They recognize the many facets of financial security— valuing planning and research more than the general popula-



tion. They are closing the gap but still need knowledgeable guidance to help ensure financial stability and informed decision-making."

Popular Stockton Street Pedestrian Safety Program Back for Fourth Year

Sidewalk Extended Temporarily along Chinatown Shopping Corridor for Chinese New Year

Mayor Ed Lee, District 3 Supervisor Julie Christensen and City department representatives joined Chinatown business and community leaders today to announce this year's kickoff of a popular program to improve the shopping experience on Stockton Street leading up to the Chinese New Year.

With a special permit, merchants along Chinatown's Stockton Street, from Broadway to Sacramento streets, can set up their merchandise displays in the curbside parking spaces fronting their businesses. Now marking its fourth year, the Stockton Street Pedestrian Enhancement Program provides more space, safety and comfort for pedestrians as they shop for food and wares on the bustling commercial stretch. The temporary program this year runs through Feb. 18, 2015.

"As we gear up to celebrate the Year of the Ram, we want to make sure that Chinatown residents, merchants and visitors to this historic neighborhood have a safe and prosperous New Year," Mayor Lee said. "We have seen the success of this program over the past three years, and I am excited to work together with Supervisor Julie Christensen and the Chinatown community so our residents and small businesses can share in our City's prosperity."

The City has partnered with the Chinatown Neighborhood Association, Chinese Chamber of Commerce, Chinese American Association of Commerce, Chinatown Merchants Association, Chinatown Community Development Center, Chinese Consolidated Benevolent Association, Community Youth Center and Recology. San Francisco Public Works, the Police Department, the Department of Public Health and the Municipal Transportation Agency will be on site to ensure that the streets and merchandise displays are kept safe.

"This collaborative program benefits our merchants, our residents and the thousands of visitors who make Stockton Street a go-to destination during the Chinese New Year and creates a safer and more festive experience for everyone involved," said Supervisor Christensen, who represents Chinatown.

"This has helped the neighborhood flourish even more during the Chinese New Year, and we are looking forward to another successful year," said Pius Lee, chair of the Chinatown Neighborhood Association.

Curbside parking will be prohibited in the program area between 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. to accommodate merchandise displays. Muni service through the area will not be disrupted.

During the program duration, deliveries along the corridor must be scheduled before 8:30 a.m. or after 7 p.m.

In addition to the temporary prohibition of curbside parking, double-parking restrictions will be strictly enforced along Stockton Street and the streets that feed into Stockton Street to make sure that traffic is not obstructed. Health inspectors will assure that food items are properly displayed.

"We found a creative solution to help businesses thrive and to make sure that our busy sidewalks



remain safe during the holiday season," said San Francisco Public Works Director Mohammed Nuru.



African American History

Signals from the Past: History of African American Innovation in Transportation

In honor of February's nationally recognized Black History Month, the United States Department of Transportation's (USDOT), Office of Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization (OSDBU) announced the beginning of a month long release series to highlight the contributions and innovations of African Americans in the transportation industry.

The USDOT Transportation walk exhibits landmark events in transportation and displays one of the many accomplishments of Garrett Morgan, an African-American inventor who in 1923 was granted the first US patent for a traffic signal to regulate vehicles and pedestrians in urban areas. This invention was one of the precursors to the modern traffic signal that motorists and pedestrians alike rely upon for travel every day.

When most people converse about Black History Month, transportation may not be the first topic that comes to mind. However, its significance, being able to move from one location to another, is at the very core of our nation's historical emphasis on mobility—whether social, economic, or geographic.

Access to transportation means access to family and friends, employment, health care, and education. It means access to opportunity. We're working hard at DOT to create Ladders of Opportunity by connecting people to jobs and economic opportunities.

Transportation does more than carry people from point A to point B, it connects dreams to reality. The various modes of transportation create Ladders of Opportunity by means of taking a person from where they are to where they aspire to be. The Ladders of Opportunity bring communities closer to jobs and jobs closer to communities.

The history of transportation is a history of connecting people. This month, we at DOT want to connect you with this rich history and continue to highlight the contributions of African Americans in the transportation industry. Be on the lookout for next week's history lesson on America's transportation.

African American Inventors

Garrett Morgan



Born: March 4, 1877 Died: August 27, 1963

Garrett Augustus Morgan, Sr. was an African-American inventor and community leader. His most notable inventions included a type of protective respiratory hood (or gas mask), a traffic signal, and a hair-straightening chemical. He is renowned for a heroic rescue in 1916 in which he and three others used the safety hood device he had developed to save workers trapped within a water intake tunnel, fifty feet beneath Lake Erie. He is also credited as the first African American in Cleveland, Ohio, to own an automobile.

The first American-made automobiles were introduced to consumers just before the turn of the 20th century, and pedestrians, bicycles, animal-drawn wagons and motor vehicles all had to share the same roads. To deal with the growing problem of traffic accidents, a number of versions of traffic signaling devices began to be developed, starting around 1913.

Morgan had witnessed a serious accident at an intersection, and he invented a traffic control device and applied for a patent on it in 1922. His invention was a hand-cranked mechanical sign system using signs that could be switched relatively easily by a traffic control officer. His device was relatively simple, yet had key additional safety features that many others at the time did not have. In addition to having "stop" and "go" indicators, it had an "all stop" signal that could be used to clear the intersection to allow pedestrians to cross or to stop cross-traffic before signaling a different direction to proceed. It also had a "half mast" warning position to indicate general caution at times when the device operator was not present. In addition to the signs, his device featured lights and warning bells powered by a battery or a connection to a main power source.

Madam C. J. Walker



Born: December 23, 1867

Died: May 25, 1919

Sarah Breedlove, known as Madam C. J. Walker, was an American entrepreneur and philanthropist, regarded as the first female self-made millionaire in America. She made her fortune by developing and marketing a successful line of beauty and hair products for black women under the company she founded, Madam C. J. Walker Manufacturing Company.

Around the time of the 1904 World's Fair, she became a commission agent selling products for Annie Turnbo Malone, an African American hair care entrepreneur. While working with Annie Malone, she adapted her knowledge of hair and hair products. She moved to Denver to work on her hair care products, and married Charles Joseph Walker, a newspaper advertising salesman. She emerged with the name Madam C. J. Walker, an independent hairdresser and retailer of cosmetic creams. After their marriage Charles Walker provided advice on advertising and promotion, while Madam C. J. Walker trained women to become "beauty culturists" and to learn the art of selling. In 1906, Madam Walker put her daughter A'Lelia (née McWilliams) in charge of the mail order operation while she and her husband traveled throughout the southern and eastern United States to expand the business.

Lewis Howard Latimer



Died: December 11, 1928

Lewis Howard Latimer was an African-American engineer and inventor who was a member of Edison's research team, which was called "Edison's Pioneers." Latimer improved the newly-invented incandescent light bulb by inventing a carbon filament (which he patented in 1881). In 1882, Latimer developed and patented a method of manufacturing his carbon filaments (patent #252,386). Later, the stronger tungsten filament replaced the carbon filament (invented by W. D. Coolidge). Latimer also invented a a threaded wooden socket for light bulbs.

Latimer developed many other inventions, including the first toilet that could be used in trains (1874, patent #147,363 - called "Water closet for railroad cars"), and a forerunner of the air conditioner (1886, patent # 334,078 - called "Apparatus for cooling and disinfecting"). In 1890, Latimer published the book Incandescent Electric Lighting, a technical guide for electrical engineers.

Elijah McCoy



Elijah J. McCoy was a Canadian-American inventor and engineer, who was notable for his 57 U.S. patents, most to do with lubrication of steam engines. Born free in Canada, he returned as a five-year-old with his family to the United States in 1847, where he lived for the rest of his life and became a US citizen.

In Michigan, McCoy could find work only as a fireman and oiler at the Michigan Central Railroad. In a home-based machine shop in Ypsilanti, Michigan McCoy also did more highly skilled work, such as developing improvements and inventions. He invented an automatic lubricator for oiling the steam engines of locomotives and ships, "Improvement in Lubricators for Steam-Engines" (U.S. Patent 129,843). Similar automatic oilers had been patented previously; one is the displacement lubricator, which had already attained widespread use and whose technological descendants continued to be widely used into the 20th century. Lubricators were a boon for railroads, as they enabled trains to run faster and more profitably with less need to stop for lubrication and maintenance. McCoy continued to refine his devices and design new ones; 50 of his patents dealt with lubricating systems. After the turn of the century, he attracted notice among his black contemporaries. Booker T. Washington in Story of the Negro (1909) recognized him as having produced more patents than any other black inventor up to that time. This creativity gave McCoy an honored status in the black community that has persisted to this day.



In general, the City does not maintain a vendor list. We depend on interests from the business community through the email notification requests in **Bid Flash**.

Standard Requirements

Purchase Orders: Most purchases charged to the City of Stockton require a purchase order. If an individual calls you and attempts to place an order without a City purchase order number, you are cautioned to request an authorized purchase order number and obtain the name and department of the individual. The purchase order number is vital to doing business with the City. It is your assurance that you will be paid.

There may be times during an emergency when an order must be placed after hours or on weekends, during times when the Purchasing Division is closed. At such times, during a true emergency, purchases without purchase order numbers will be approved. Be sure to obtain the individual's name/department

Shipment:

Deliveries in almost all cases are required to be made to the City, FOB destination.

Insurance Requirements:

In all instances where vendor personnel enter City property for requested services, the City requires a certificate of insurance verifying coverage. 

freight chokepoints that drive up the cost of owning a business?

How will we move better? Technological changes and innovation may transform vehicles and infrastructure, logistics, and delivery of transportation services to promote efficiency and safety. How will we knock down barriers to new technologies that promise to make travel safer and more convenient?

How will we adapt? Climate change will include global mean sea level rise, temperature increases, and more frequent and intense storm events, all of which will impact highways, bridges, public transportation, coastal ports and waterways. How will we make our infrastructure more resilient to extreme weather events like Hurricane Sandy?

How will we align decisions and dollars? And invest the trillions of dollars our transportation needs in the smartest way possible?

In January 2014, the Department began assembling a team of experts from across the Agency's modes and offices. This team established a structure, took a holistic look at our Nation's transportation system, identified key trends affecting our network, examined the potential impacts of such trends on a future transportation system, and provided a comprehensive range of policy options and potential choices. Additionally, the team met with several transportation thought leaders from around the country. As the report was coming together, the team shared key findings in six public webinar sessions that drew 1,300 participants.

Beyond Traffic is structured in three parts. The first part discusses the major trends shaping our changing transportation system. The second part discusses the implications of these trends for each mode of transportation: highways, transit, pedestrian and bicycle, aviation, intercity and freight rail, maritime and pipeline. The third part presents a description of a possible future scenario based on the trends analyzed in the previous section. It concludes with a discussion of policy options based on the implications of these trends.

As the U.S. attempts to address its growing transportation demands, it's critical that all the data and research that exists is examined with a holistic approach to addressing the challenges ahead. This report offers a clear and honest assessment of the network's status, deficiencies, capacity, and potential to better support our economic and social well-being. It examines not only the condition and performance of our transportation system today, but forecasts how it will look and perform in 2045 if current funding levels and policies persist.

This analysis is a framework for the future; it is not prescriptive. It does not advocate for specific policy solutions. Rather, it underscores critical decision points facing the country, by means of data-driven analysis, research, expert opinions and public engagement.

President's 2016 Budget Requests \$233.5 Million For Treasury's CDFI Fund

President Obama released the Administration's Fiscal Year (FY) 2016 Budget proposal, which includes \$233.5 million for the U.S. Treasury Department's Community Development Financial Institutions Fund (CDFI Fund). This funding would extend the CDFI Fund's efforts to spur economic development and job growth in underserved communities.

"The President's 2016 Budget calls for everyone to share in the prosperity of a growing America, and it makes the critical investments needed to accelerate and sustain economic growth in areas that need it the most," said CDFI Fund Director Annie Donovan. "This request provides essential support to the important and innovative work of Community Development Financial Institutions, and these organizations have a proven track record of leveraging private sector investments to attract businesses, jobs, and services to low-income urban and rural communities across the country."

Highlights of the FY 2016 Budget request for the CDFI Fund include:

• \$157.5 million for the Community Development Financial Institutions Program, a \$5 million increase from FY 2015;

- \$35 million for the Healthy Food Financing Initiative, which is a \$13 million and 60 percent increase from FY2015; and
- \$16 million for the Native American CDFI Assistance Program, a \$1 million increase from FY 2015.

The Budget proposes permanently extending the New Markets Tax Credit Program at \$5 billion per year and extending the CDFI Bond Guarantee Program through FY 2017. The remainder of the request is for funding for administration of the CDFI Fund's overall programs, including the restoration of the Capital Magnet Fund, which provides affordable housing grants funded from non-appropriated sources.

SBA Loan Program

Microloan Program

The Microloan program provides loans up to \$50,000 to help small businesses and certain not-for-profit childcare centers start up and expand. The average microloan is about \$13,000.

The U.S. Small Business Administration provides funds to specially designated intermediary lenders, which are nonprofit community-based organizations with experience in lending as well as management and technical assistance. These intermediaries administer the Microloan program for eligible borrowers.

Eligibility Requirements

Each intermediary lender has its own lending and credit requirements. Generally, intermediaries require some type of collateral as well as the personal guarantee of the business owner.

Use of Microloan Proceeds

Microloans can be used for:

- Working capital
- Inventory or supplies
- Furniture or fixtures

Machinery or equipment
 Proceeds from an SBA microloan cannot be used to

pay existing debts or to purchase real estate.

Repayment Terms, Interest Rates, and Fees

Loan repayment terms vary according to several factors:

- Loan amount
- Planned use of funds
- Requirements determined by the intermediary lender
- · Needs of the small business borrower

The maximum repayment term allowed for an SBA microloan is six years.

Interest rates vary, depending on the intermediary lender and costs to the intermediary from the U.S. Treasury. Generally, these rates will be between 8 and 13 percent.

Application Process

Microloans are available through certain nonprofit, community-based organizations that are experienced in lending and business management assistance. If you apply for SBA microloan financing, you may be required to fulfill training or planning requirements before your loan application is considered. This business training is designed to help you launch or expand your business.

Find a Microloan Provider

To apply for a Microloan, you must work with an SBA approved intermediary in your area. Approved intermediaries make all credit decisions on SBA microloans. For more information, you can contact your local SBA District Office - https://www.sba.gov/ tools/local-assistance/districtoffices

7(a) Loan Program Eligibility

SBA provides loans to businesses; so the requirements of eligibility are based on specific aspects of the business and its principals. As such, the key factors of eligibility are based on what the business does to receive its income, the character of its ownership and where the business operates.

SBA generally does not specify what businesses are eligible. Rather, the agency outlines what businesses are not eligible. However, there are some universally applicable requirements. To be eligible for assistance, businesses must:

- Operate for profit
- Be small, as defined by SBA
- Be engaged in, or propose to do business in, the United States or its possessions
- Have reasonable invested equity
- Use alternative financial resources, including personal assets, before seeking financial assistance
- Be able to demonstrate a need for the loan proceeds
- Use the funds for a sound business purpose
- Not be delinquent on any existing debt obligations to the U.S. government
- Ineligible Businesses

A business must be engaged in an activity SBA determines as acceptable for financial assistance from a federal provider. The following list of businesses types are not eligible for assistance because of the activities they conduct:

- Financial businesses primarily engaged in the business of lending, such as banks, finance companies, payday lenders, some leasing companies and factors (pawn shops, although engaged in lending, may qualify in some circumstances)
- Businesses owned by developers and landlords that do not actively use or occupy the assets acquired or improved with the loan proceeds (except when the property is leased to the business at zero profit for the property's owners)

- Life insurance companies
- Businesses located in a foreign country (businesses in the U.S. owned by aliens may qualify)
- Businesses engaged in pyramid sale distribution plans, where a participant's primary incentive is based on the sales made by an ever-increasing number of participants
- Businesses deriving more than one-third of gross annual revenue from legal gambling activities
- Businesses engaged in any illegal activity
- Private clubs and businesses that limit the number of memberships for reasons other than capacity
- Government-owned entities
- Businesses principally engaged in teaching, instructing, counseling or indoctrinating religion or religious beliefs, whether in a religious or secular setting
- Consumer and marketing cooperatives (producer cooperatives are eligible)
- Loan packagers earning more than one third of their gross annual revenue from packaging SBA loans
- Businesses in which the lender or CDC, or any of its associates owns an equity interest
- Businesses that present live performances of an indecent sexual nature or derive directly or indirectly more 2.5 percent of gross revenue through the sale of products or services, or the presentation of any depictions or displays, of an indecent sexual nature
- Businesses primarily engaged in political or lobbying activities
- Speculative businesses (such as oil exploration)

There are also eligibility factors for financial assistance based on the activities of the owners and the historical operation of the business. As such, the business cannot have been:

- A business that caused the government to have incurred a loss related to a prior business debt
- A business owned 20 percent or more by a person associated with a different business that caused the government to have incurred a loss related to a prior business debt
- A business owned 20 percent or more by a person who is incarcerated, on probation, on parole, or has been indicted for a felony or a crime of moral depravity

Special Considerations

Special considerations apply to some types of businesses and individuals, which include:

- Franchises are eligible except when a franchiser retains power to control operations to such an extent as to equate to an employment contract; the franchisee must have the right to profit from efforts commensurate with ownership
- Recreational facilities and clubs are eligible if the facilities are open to the general public, or in membership-only situations, membership is not selectively denied or restricted to any particular groups
- Farms and agricultural businesses are eligible, but these applicants should first explore Farm Service Agency (FSA) programs, particularly if the applicant has a prior or existing relationship with FSA
- Fishing vessels are eligible, but those seeking funds for the construction or reconditioning of vessels with a cargo capacity of five tons or more must first request financing from the National Marine Fisheries Service
- Privately owned medical facilities including hospitals, clinics, emergency outpatient facilities, and medical and dental laboratories are eligible; recovery and nursing homes are also eligible, provided they are licensed by the appropriate government agency and they provide more than room and board
- An Eligible Passive Company (EPC) must use loan proceeds to acquire or lease, and/or improve or renovate, real or personal property that it leases to one or more operating companies and must not make any profit from conducting its activities
- Legal aliens are eligible; however, consideration is given to status (e.g., resident, lawful temporary resident) in determining the business' degree of risk
- Probation or parole: Applications will not be accepted from firms in which a principal is currently incarcerated, on parole, on probation or is a defendant in a criminal proceeding Source: U.S. SBA

Construction and transportation organization officials were pleased to see the plan. Stephen Sandherr, Associated General Contractors of America CEO, said in a statement, "The president's budget proposal opens the door to a healthy debate about the best way to finance our long-term infrastructure needs."

Pete Ruane, American Road & Transportation Builders Association CEO, said, "Passage of a robust, six-year transportation investment proposal as envisioned by the president would send the right signal to states planning new projects and to private-sector companies contemplating whether to hire workers and make capital investment decisions."

Bud Wright, American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials executive director, also praised the proposal but noted, "We know the hardest conversations will involve how to fund infrastructure investments." Obama proposes to pay for the increased surface-transportation increases via a onetime 14% "transition toll" on the estimated \$1 trillion to \$2 trillion in U.S. companies' untaxed foreign earnings. The plan is more detailed than the one the administration proposed last year.

The Treasury Dept. estimates the 14% tax would raise \$248.3 billion over the next five years.

Jeff Zients, director of the White House National Economic Council, said at a press briefing that the 14% tax "is not a one-off proposal but part of a broader set of corporate tax changes. He also said the tax "is very different than a repatriation holiday, which we believe is bad policy."

the major drivers of economic change in the U.S. are quite confident in what's to come this year. The NFIB's monthly Optimism Index is at the highest level we have seen since October 2006. Eight of the 10 index components experienced positive gains between November and December 2014. Major highlights of the index include 54% of business owners indicating they were looking to hire, 20% expecting a sales gain in December, and 17% planning to raise compensation levels in the coming months.

Comprising around 50% of the country's GDP, small businesses play a critical role in the overall success of our economy. Positivity from small businesses at large gives Americans at large much to be optimistic about as well in 2015. NFIB Chief Economist Bill Dunkelberg confirms this linkage.
